EDUCATION QUESTIONS

We ask about the education of the informant, his father, mother, wife, and one of his brothers. The same basic question is used for each, although there are minor variations which are noted below. Note that we have attempted in the precodes to provide for those educated in Scotland and Ireland.

a. 'Ordinary' schools include primary schools (post-1944) and 'elementary' schools (pre-1944.) These schools may be 'church' (denominational) schools, which may be 'maintained', 'aided' or 'controlled' by local education authorities. 'Ordinary' schools include 'national' schools in Ireland. Occasionally very old respondents who attended 'elementary' schools may report that they paid a penny or twopence a week. This does not make them private schools for our purpose.

'Private' schools are those in which most children attending pay fees (even though the informant may not have done so.) They include the so-called 'preparatory' schools attended by children up to the age of 13 before going on to the independent so-called 'public' schools. They also include the now extinct 'junior' departments (for children under 11) of grammar schools.

b. Note that we want you to code all categories which apply. In the case, for example, of a man who went to a preparatory school until age 13, and then went to another school, you would code 'private' in (a); you code 'stayed at same school' plus the appropriate code for the school he attended next in (b).

Primary Schools - Elementary schools were State or Church schools controlled by local education authorities (see above) for children aged 5 to school leaving age. They were renamed and re-organised after 1944. After that date, children up to the age of 11 attended 'primary' schools, and children over 11 attended 'secondary' schools. There were still, for some years after 1944, a number of un-reorganised all-age schools, especially in rural districts, taking children for both the primary and secondary stages in their schooling.

Central, Intermediate, Higher Elementary and Senior schools are pre-1944 schools in the general class of 'elementary' schools.

Grammar and Technical schools are selective schools and admit children on the basis of an examination at the age of 11 plus, or in some cases at 13 plus. Secondary Modern schools do not select their pupils but receive those who do not gain admission to either grammar or technical schools. In Scotland these non-selected children sometimes proceed to the 'advanced' division of an all-age school.

Comprehensive schools are for children over the age of 11; there is no selective entry. They were established soon after 1944 but only in the last 5 years have they admitted more than a tiny proportion of secondary school children.

Multilateral and Bilateral schools are combinations of two or more of the types of school, grammar, technical and modern, sharing a common site and facilities and working under a centralised direction.

Secondary Schools - Grammar, technical, modern and comprehensive schools are post 1944 schools in the general class of 'secondary' schools.

Direct Grant schools are schools having 25% at least of their pupils recruited from state primary schools with free places. The rest of the places are fee-paying. These schools get their money directly from the Central Government and not from a local education authority. Sometimes informants are not certain if a school was a Direct Grant school. In such cases, please code 'Direct Grant' but also write in the name of the school and the location.

Independent schools include both the public schools and other private fee-paying schools. 'Fee-paying' refers to the school, not the student, i.e. a school in which most students pay fees even though the informant may not have done so.

Scottish Senior Secondary schools is a separate category because in some areas they may be similar to English grammar schools, whereas in other areas they are more nearly equivalent to the English comprehensive.

Irish 'Secondary' schools are state schools in Ireland in which fees were paid until a few years ago. They should not be taken to include all secondary education in Ireland, as they were attended by a relatively small proportion of the population. You should always PROBE to be certain it is this particular type of school to which the informant is referring, and not secondary schooling generally.

Special schools are for children who are handicapped in such a way or to such a degree as not to be suitably educated in ordinary state schools. Please try to get the name and location of the school and ALWAYS specify the type (e.g. Open Air, Blind, Deaf, ESN, MH, Maladjusted).

There is a place to write in the details (type, name and location) of any school which is not provided for. These are schools which could have been attended only by a fraction of 1% of the population: state boarding schools (get name and local authority), army schools, fee-paying local corporation schools (in Scotland),etc.

You will find that most schools fit readily into these categories. If a school has changed type, e.g. grammar school becoming a secondary modern school, you should code according to what it was when the informant attended it. If it changed whilst he was there, code it according to what it was when he entered. If you do not know which code is applicable, please circle the code(s) you think applies and write the name and location of the school at the side.

- c. For those for whom fees were paid, find out between which ages fees were paid. We are not interested in fees paid by lodges, scholarships, etc., but only fees paid by the family. Nor are we interested in the penny or twopence a week sometimes paid by the parents of very old informants.
- d. Those who attended school before 1921 may have left at age 12 when part-time working was permitted. Statutory school leaving age was raised to 14 in 1921 and to 15 in 1947. If the informant knows that he left at the school leaving age, but does not recall the exact age, tick the box.
- e. The form of this question varies slightly. For informants we ask 'Did you pass any of these exams before leaving school?' and ask later if any of these exams were passed after leaving school. But for parents, brothers and wives, we only ask the question once: 'Did you pass any of these exams?' This is an important distinction so you must read the question exactly as it appears on the page. Passing the exams 'before leaving school' means that the informant was entered by the school. Occasionally he may have actually left the school a few months before taking the examination, but so long as the school entered him for it, it counts as 'before leaving school.'

In 1950 the system of examinations at the end of secondary schooling was changed. Up to that time, the examination taken at 15 or 16 was School Certificate, which was either passed or failed as a whole. If you got a high standard you could also get Matriculation (meaning the minimum entry requirements to university) on the same examination. This was followed by a two year course in the sixth form leading to the Higher School Certificate which school children normally took before entering the university.

After 1950 School Certificate was replaced by the General Certificate of Education O level. In this you can take as many subjects as you like, there is no passing or failing as a whole, and therefore we want to know the number of passes. The post-1950 equivalent of Higher School Certificate is the General Certificate of Education A level. The Certificate of Secondary Education is a lower level qualification than the General Certificate of Education.

In the case of the Scottish exams we ask the number of passes. This will not always apply; although the present exams are similar to English 0 and A levels, they have not always been so. If the informant says that the examination he took was passed as a whole, just tick on the line for number of passes.

'Scotland: O levels/O grade/Day School Higher/Intermediate Certificate' all refer to examinations roughly equivalent to the English O levels and usually taken one year past the school leaving age. Informants occasionally confuse them with School Certificates given to show school attendance for a specified period, so you should PROBE to establish if this is the case. The Higher Leaving Certificate is roughly equivalent to English O levels and here too you should PROBE as needed to be certain that it is not being confused with a mere certificate of attendance given the student when he leaves school.

Clerical and commercial qualifications can be taken in Institutions of Further Education, Night Schools, Technical Colleges etc., but may also be taken in Secondary schools in some cases.

We are not interested in S (Scholarship) exams. These exams are usually taken in conjunction with A levels, but should not be included when counting the number of passes.

'Additional' examinations in such subjects as Maths, should be counted as

PROBE in this question for other exams, e.g. Civil Service clerical and executive exams and G.L.C. or other local authority exams.

Further Education - In some cases, several codes may apply to the same experience. For example, an apprenticeship would almost certainly be full-time and might include sandwich courses - so you would circle 1, 5 and 8. You would then put an 'a' by each of the codes and on the line for details repeat the 'a' and give field and length.

If there were another educational experience, e.g. an evening course in art appreciation, you would circle 7, put a 'b' by it and note the details under 'b'.

g. (i) in the case of the Informant

When you come to qualifications you must then relate them to the form of further education by which they were obtained. In the case cited above, you would circle 'Ordinary trade apprenticeship', and then put an 'a' by it to indicate that the further education details recorded under 'a' apply to this qualification. EVERY QUALIFICATION (excepting Category 2, qualifications gained in the Armed Forces) SHOULD BE RELATED IN THIS WAY TO THE FURTHER EDUCATION QUESTION.

Accept all qualifications the informant tells you about, even if you think them irrelevant or not really a qualification. We can always eliminate anything irrelevant in the office.

OCCUPATION ARP INDUSTRY

We have a number of questions asking for detailed job descriptions - the informant's job at several points in time, his father's job at several different times. This information is crucial to our study and must be collected with great care. We know that it will sometimes be difficult to get as much detail as we wish for some of the occupations, but it is important that you know the kind of information we are aiming at.

OCCUPATION

In order to classify occupations we use the Registrar General's Classification of Occupations as used in the national census.

In this classification there are some 200 main groups of types of occupation, and a further breakdown indicating the socio-economic groups to which each occupation has been assigned. It also shows for each job whether the work involved is mainly of a manual type or not. In order to allow for such factors, the classification consists in all of some 30,000 specific job descriptions which are obviously far too many for you to learn off by heart. For example, there are some 300 different codes from which to choose if a person tells you he is a 'cleaner', depending on whether he cleans airgates on drainage, or copper in a brewery, or trays in a bakery, to pick but three of the 300.

In the space for Occupation you should record in full, the informant's name for his job (for example, not just 'engineer' but chief electrical engineer or consultant civil engineer) and a clear description of the kind of work he does and the nature of the operation performed. If an informant has more than one occupation, collect details of the one on which he spends most of his working time and receives most of his income from. If it is not clear which is the main occupation, collect details of both including the proportion of time spent on each and the proportion of income derived from each.

It is not possible to devise any one question that will fit all cases, and the interviewer should adapt her approach to suit the situation.

If the informant's description of his occupation is too technical or vague :

'What kind of work is that ?' OR 'What do you actually do in that job?

are the most useful probes. The interviewer should realise that certain items that may present no difficulty to her because she is familiar with local industries may be incomprehensible to the staff at Nuffield, and should therefore be explained. Sometimes informants will tell you in considerable detail what their job is 'concerned with' but not what they actually do. For example, your work is 'concerned with' market research, polls etc., but that does not tell us your occupation. There are some occupations which pose particular difficulties unless detailed information is collected. You should be on the look out for such cases. Some examples are:

- 1. ENGINEER It is not enough for somebody to answer 'engineer', as this can cover anything from a fully qualified professional to a semi-skilled operator. When an informant answers in vague terms, we in Nuffield would want to know what his full title is, and full details of the sort of work he is engaged in. For example, if he says 'electrical engineer', is he responsible for designing or planning the production or maintenance of electrical equipment, or, on the other hand, is he himself installing, maintaining or repairing electrical equipment. In other words, we want to know what the person himself actually does. This means that the term 'engineer' should never appear on its own unless an informant cannot answer about another person's occupation any more exactly than this.
- 2. MACHINIST There are at least 1,000 different types of machinist, and the socio-economic grouping and/or social class depends on the type of machinist. There are 'machine grinders', 'machine cutters', 'machine casters', 'machine drillers', etc., and obviously we want to know which type of machinist the informant is.
- 3. MINERS There are several types of miner. Some work at the coal face, underground, and some are surface workers, and the term 'miner' can include 'coal cutter', 'trimmers' (coal and coal mine), 'haulage hand', etc. We want always to know his full job description and whether or not he works at the coal face.

- 1. COLLECTORS This term covers nearly 80 different types of worker. For example, there are 'debt', 'rent', 'meter', 'rate' and 'salvage' collectors, and 'collectors of custom and excise', to name a few.
- 5. TECHNICIANS The term technician also has a wide range of usage and can be applied over almost the whole range of the social class and socioeconomic groupings. Here we want to know whether the informant is, e.g. a Surgical Technician or a Radar Technician, a Cine Technician or any of the other approximately 40 different types of technical worker. We also want to know exactly what he does. Sometimes people who describe themselves as technicians turn out to be electrical fitters or generating station attendants, and this is the kind of detail we want.
- 6. LABORATORY ASSISTANTS Here again this occupation may be used to describe someone who merely washes the utensils and instruments and cleans the laboratory generally. Whenever this occupation is given, describe fully the duties of the informant and the work he actually does.
- 7. CIVIL SERVANTS We want to know the informant's job within the Civil Service, i.e. what he actually does. However, you should ALWAYS continue by giving the informant Card I and asking him in which category he would place his job. This card should also be used in those cases where Civil Servants refuse to specify the kind of work they do.
- 8. REGULARS IN ARMED FORCES Get rank and corps.

As you can see, these general headings like 'Machinist' or 'Miner' etc. are not sufficient in themselves and the fullest description should be given when such occupations are mentioned by the informant. You should consider whether what you have elicited gives you and the coders a clear idea of how the informant spends a typical day, not minute by minute, but in terms of the skills he is using, both mental and physical. Never suggest the type of job to the informant, always ask him to describe it in his own words. REMEMBER NO JOB IS SELF-EXPLANATORY.

INDUSTRY (Trade or Profession)

The heading 'Industry' is a shortened heading meant to cover 'trade' or 'profession' as well as industry. In this space you should record a clear description of the function of the informant's employer. You can tell the informant that we do not use the name of the employers and that you will not even record it. What we want, and what you must ask the informant is 'What kind of firm is it /do you work for ?' Firm here means the establishment where the informant works, which may be only a part or branch of the firm.

If a person works for a very large and well known company it is still relevant to ask this question about what the firm does. Never merely record a firm's name or initials because you think the coders will know what the firm does. You can say to your informant that naturally you have heard of the firm, but you should check by asking him to tell you 'What is done at the (part/branch) of the firm in which you work?'

When we say 'what the firm does' we mean we want to know whether they manufacture or process at the establishment (and if so, what). If the plant is not engaged in either manufacturing or processing, we want to know its function, e.g. whether it is engaged in insurance, banking, wholesale or retail trades, transport, civil engineering or some other activity.

Remember that you can not necessarily infer industry from occupation. For example, we encountered a man who had worked as a barber in a pullman car. His occupation would be 'barber', his industry 'railways.' So you must always ask about the industry; never assume it.

NEITHER ON OCCUPATIONS NOR INDUSTRY, TRADE OR PROFESSION SHOULD YOU EVER PROMPT.

Employment Status. This is the 9-category code which is included after the job/industry description.

SELF-EMPLOYED. Persons not employed by any person or company and persons working in their own home for an employer (out-worker). The following for example are included: proprietors of businesses (including members of partnerships), all parochial clergy and general practitioners. The following for example are excluded: directors and managers of limited companies, all persons in national and local government and nationalised undertakings, and medical doctors in private practice who are also employed as National Health Service consultants.

MANAGERS. The following are regarded as managers in the employment status code: assistant manager, under manager, departmental manager, factory manager, general manager, mill manager, works manager, factory superintendent, managing director, chairman, director, company director.

For anyone who is self-employed or a manager or superintendent, i.e. above foreman level, ask 'the number of people employed, in all capacities, in the establishment where you work.' PROBE: 'Are there 25 or more people or less than 25?'

Note that categories 4 and 5 ('A Manager in an establishment with 25 or more employees'; 'A Manager in an establishment with less than 25 employees') refer to the number of employees in the entire establishment not only to those supervised by the informant.

FOREMAN/SUPERVISOR. Includes: boss, chargehand, chargeman, gaffer, ganger, head man, overlooker, overman and overseer.

APPRENTICES AND TRAINEES. Include: apprentices, articled clerks, articled pupils, graduate apprentices, management trainees, student apprentices, trainee craftsmen, trainee technicians. The term 'improver' is also used as a synonym for apprentice. This category is always included, but there are questions on which you would not expect it to apply, e.g. father's occupation when informant was 16, and you should probe carefully in such cases.

FAMILY WORKER. These are persons employed by a relative and living in the same household as their employer. Family workers who are managers, foremen, or apprentices are coded as managers, etc., and not as family workers.

There are instances in which you may TICK if the informant has the same occupation as described in a previous question, e.g. on Question 28, job three years ago, you TICK if it is exactly the same job as now.

Do not use this or similar boxes unless the job really is EXACTLY the same - same company, same place, no promotion. Occasionally, you may have an informant who has 'changed jobs' but is doing exactly the same work in a new location. In such cases, you should not tick the box, but should treat it as a totally different job.

The aim of this book is to give detailed coding of the variables on the main data tape for the 1972 Oxford Mobility enquiry and to present it in as comprehensible a form as possible. Working through in order from variable 1 to the end, the variable number, name, relevant questionnaire number if appropriate and codes are given. In certain cases, details are found in appendices at the end. References are made to other variables, to the appendices to the questionnaire, and to various publications used in the coding or where procedure is fully and definitively explained (e.g. Goldthorpe and Hope: The Social Grading of Occupations - a new approach and scale 1974). The code book alone, therefore, is not adequate for analysis and a copy of the questionnaire at least is required. Certain ambiguities will remain - hopefully not all of them due to inadequacies in the code book itself.

In many cases, the variable name is assumed to be adequate clue to the content of the variable. Various conventions are used:-

Where the names are not enough, hopefully, again, the coding details and other references will make the contents clear. It must be stressed that these names are only useful shorthand for recognition of a variable one like "respondent's age" may well not be in a single or expected form ready tor analysis. The distinction can be made here between what might be called 'raw' and 'recoded' variables. The former were those coded directly from the questionnaire, and include most of V.1 - V.875. The remainder are some, and to some extent arbitrary, reconstructions and recodes from the 'raw' variables. Many may not be useful to analysts, and others would be preferable, though some (e.g. the occupational category variables) are an essential part of the mobility project.

Various points can be made about recurring features in the data set. Firstly, the variable names may be misleading where the F convention is used. Unless otherwise stated this does not just refer to respondent's father, but to his 'head of family' (see questionnaire P7). If this was the mother, then the 'mother' variables will be coded as missing data. Also the 'job' variables are for full-time jobs only though the definition of this was far from strict. That is, in most cases it was left to the respondent to decide and only occasionally would the official definition (i.e. 30 or more hours a week) be referred to.

A mention of missing data may be useful to some. It is always to be remembered that this code is inclusive of all not otherwise specifically coded in the variable and a respondent can be coded on this for a number of reasons. The clubs and associations variables (V.835 - V.848) or amenities (V.679 - V.682), for example, have codes for membership or possession but not specifically for non-membership or non-possession. These latter cases form part of the missing data code.

Furthermore, no coding details are given for a small proportion of the list. This is either because they are interview or sampling variables, of administrative or "internal" reference only, or because they were recodes for specific enquiries now completed and are, therefore, again "internal"

rather than for public inspection.

Finally, with many of the education recode variables in particular, a score on a variable where a respondent may have more than one qualification, for instance, means the highest score on that variable. In an academic qualifications variable, for example, having GCE's and a degree will mean it is the degree which is counted.

Occupations, Employment Status and Industry

(i) Occupations

Variables like V.5 (F JOB AT 14) in fact refer to occupational categories. Occupations were coded using the OPCS "Classification of Occupations" 1970.

Self employed

See p. viii (A) of Classification of Occupations - the distinction between 1, 2 and 3 being based on number of employees. All farmers are excluded from 1 (and coded either as 2 or 3). 3 refers to self employed "who work without paid assistance other than family employees". (e.g. out-workers, members of partnerships without paid employee(s), parochial clergy). The coding is hierarchial in

that unless a job is clearly of a certain status (where it could be classified in more than one way) it is coded to the highest, i.e. self employed then managers etc.

Managers

The rules governing the use of codes 4 and 5 are on p xvii and p viii (B(1)) and are determined by the occupation code. The distinction between them is based on size of establishment. (see below):

Jobs are coded 4 and 5 either:

- (i) Where the occupation is preceded by an "M" in the alphabetical index of the Classification of Occupations
- or (ii) If the occupation code is 002, 115, 138, 143, 149, 154, 156, 159, 171, 173 180 (Unless the respondent is self-employed)
- or (iii) Where the job is described as "Company director" (see pp xv xvi. note (5) (Classification of Occupations)) unless the occupation code is 181-2, 184, 186, 195-8, 200-5, 209-14, 217. In these cases, codes 14 and 15 are used.

Codes 14 and 15 are used in cases where there is clear evidence of managerial status but the rules specified above do not allow the use of codes 4 and 5. Managerial status is defined primarily by the occurrence in the job-title or description of the term "manager" or one of the synonyms listed in note (ii) p xvi : e.g. assistant manager, departmental manager, works superintendant etc. The use of 14 and 15 entail supervisory and administrative functions at the same level of responsibility as where "manager" (or synonym) appear explicitly.

Note. 27 and 37 are for trainee managers in large and small establishments (see apprentices and trainees).

4, 14 (and 27) used for those in establishments of 25 or more employees. 5, 15 (and 37) used otherwise.

Where coded as managers, civil servants, local government officials, ship's officers, aircraft captains, and flight managers are always coded 4, 14 (and 27).

Where coded as managers, farmers, trawler skippers, and foresters are always coded as 5, 15 (and 37). (See p viii B (1) Classification of Occupations).

Foremen and Supervisors

(See p xvii Classification of Occupations). Use of code 6 is determined in two ways:

- (a) if the occupation code is O31 or 142 or if the job-title entry in the alphabetical index has an 'F' preceding the code (e.g. 'Undercarder': p. 12, top of the third column F064)
- (b) if the job-title or description contains the term 'foreman' or one of the synonyms listed (p xv), unless preceded by a qualifying term such as 'assistant', 'deputy', 'working', etc.

Code 16 is used where the above rules preclude code 6, but where the job-description shows that an equivalent supervisory role is performed.

Code 19 is used where there is an indication of some supervisory function, but at a lower level of responsibility than that required for codes 6 or 16.

Apprentices and Trainees

See Classification of Occupations p xvi, and list of terms on p xv.

The 'apprentice' code takes precedence wherever it and some other might apply. Note that codes 27 and 37 are used for 'trainee managers', the choice depending on size of establishment.

Family Employee

As defined on p ix (4) 'Family Workers'. Note that the definition requires that the person live in the household of the family member employing him. All other codes (except 9) take precedence whenever they are applicable.

Armed Forces

For occupation codes 221 and 222 the following special rules apply to the coding of employment status:

(iii) Industry

Coding is based on the three-digit 'Minimum List' headings of the Classification of Industry as used in the 1971 Census (for a summary, see 'Classification of Occupations', 1970 pp 110-113).

Because the codes are here applied to informants own statements, not to an official decision on the activity of a named workplace, some additional codes have been introduced to cover ambiguous, multiple and inadequately-described industries.

The intention was to code the 'controlling' industry, not, as in the census, the specific workplace activity. Thus a central catering establishment of British Rail would be coded as 'Rail Transport', not catering. The rationale is that the industry code then reflects the sectoral position and, indirectly, economic prospects of a job, while its content is referenced more appropriately by the occupation code. This use should be distinguished from that of the Registrar-General.

Appendix B

Further Education and Qualifications

The form of the variables i)

There are five sets of basically very similar qualifications variables: V.68-V.100 and V.102-V.161 (respondent), V.162-V.242 (Head of respondent's family), not head of family), V.324-V.404 (selected brother), V.243-V.323 (Mother when V.405-V.485 (Wife of respondent). None of the information regarding school examinations taken after leaving school (i.e. from Q3h, Q13e, Q14e, Q19e, Q34e) is included in these variables.

Not only are they very similar to each other (they are identical in form except for respondent's qualifications - see below) but they are internally repetitive. Thus only the coding for a subset for each of these five sets of variables need be given, and the sets explained. (The respondent variables will be used as examples).

All five sets begin with three variables:

- e.g. V.68 NUMBER OF QUALIF ITEMS R
 - V.69 TOTAL NUMBER OF QUALIF R
 - V.70 LEISURE QUALIF R

An 'item' is a set of further education experiences and qualifications (or possibly just qualifications if its associated further education information was not gathered e.g. for foreign qualifications) which constitute a single experience defined in terms of the institutional and administrative details and content of that experience. Thus the further education information (Q3f, Q13f, Q14f, Q19f, Q34f) was combined where possible with the qualifications details (Q3i, Q13g, Q14g, Q19g, Q34g) to give the characteristic form of these sets:-

- an 'item' (1) Further education method (divided into 'main' method and up to 2 'sub-methods')
 (2) 2 qualifications (of course, only 1 may be utilised) associated with
 - the educational experience to make up an item
 - (3) Up to six items are possible for each respondent, head of family, etc.

The existence of an 'item' was decided by the coder - usually in agreement with the interviewer but not necessarily so (see Questionnaire P47, f and g). Often, if one 'method' and qualification was not undertaken at the same time as another, it does not constitute an item:

- 1958-1961 is not an item: one does not 1961-1964 "contain" the other e.g. a) First degree
 - b) Higher degree

b) Day release and ONC, age 16-18 } is an 'item' whereas

However, this is not hard-and-fast. The contemporaneous education and/or qualification experience may be separate 'items'

- e.g. a) In-firm management training. 1971 (still in progress)
 - b) Other vocational training external Ph.D., engineering. 1971 (still in progress)

or contiguous courses (short) may together constitute a single overall qualification and make up an 'item':

- e.g. In-firm training (GPO engineering)
 - a) relay maintenance (exchange) 1965
 - b) STD routeing 1967
 - c) Telex line maintenance 1968

Similarly, when courses or qualifications are preliminary or earlier parts of a qualification (and are not taken to be qualifications apart from the final or overall level) they make up an 'item'.

e.g. a) Day release: HNC 1964 b) Day release: S1 1960 c) Day release: S2 1962

It is possible that an 'item' involves more than the 2 qualifications allowed in this structure. If so, the 3rd, 4th, etc., make up a further 'item' even though they are properly part of the same experience.

A possible example is:

a) Apprenticeship 1955-60 b) Evening classes 1955-57 c) Day release: ONC 1957-60

[The existence or constitution of an 'item' is not always clear, and they provide only a possibly helpful structuring of the data rather than an inflexible constraint

PPENDIX D

Three "location" variables are described here; the coding is the same for each of the sets of variables (e.g. mother's location, respondent's at first job location, etc.).

These are the "county", "authority type" and "district" variables (e.g. V.625, V.626, V.627). Though they form three variables, the three were coded together as 5 digits and thus a score on one of the three is always accompanied by the appropriate score on the other two. Missing data is 91000 on the 5-digit code and 5 (on the "authority type") and 71 (on the "district") are legitimate values.

Individual counties (England and Wales only; the Channel Islands and Isle of Man, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Forces - if no other information) were coded as below using the 1961 Census for county and local authority divisions in England and Wales. Thus any location in England and Wales was given a 5 digit code (here divided into three variables), county (up to 2 digits), authority (1 digit), district (up to 2 digits) and the fixing of a location into the code involved reference to the Registrar-General's 'Index of Place Names in England and Wales' (HMSO 1953: 2 vols.): the process was simplified in the many cases where the location specified by the informant was the name of a Local Authority area, typically a County Borough or Metropolitan Borough. The "conurbation' codes were never, in practice, used, since more precise information was always available.
