

The DATA

Each child surveyed in 1961 drawn from the 9 and 14 year old cohorts and who returned a completed questionnaire in 1978-9 (follow up) is included in the data files.

Each person or case consists of ~~2~~ eight cards of 80 columns.

CARD1 · Variables from the teacher's questionnaire 1961 (Code sheet 1)
Card2

CARD3 2 and 3 consist of variables from the parental questionnaire filled in in 1961. (See Code sheet 2)

CARDS 4 to 8 Refer to the present follow up study. (Code sheet 3).
Variable names on the SPSS control file (SSRC.DAT)
are the same as those listed in the code sheet.

Value labels for the most important variables are contained in the SPSS control file. The labels however are only a rough guide, as there is a limitation of length imposed by SPSS. The code sheet contains the only totally accurate listing of labels.

Notes on system of grading occupations

In the original 1961 parental questionnaire the parents were asked to give details of the father's occupation. The occupations were ~~then~~ graded according to the Hall Jones grading of occupations (P app. 1.)
Hall Jones

The variable name for father's job on card 2 is HUSJOB.

In the present follow-up survey the Hall Jones system was preserved.

~~Male~~ Self reported occupations for males were graded according to this system in the following fashion

- a) SCLASISJ grade at first job
- b) SCLASLST grade of latest or last job
- c) SCLASHG ~~grade~~ Highest grade obtained in any job
- d) SCLASLG Lowest grade obtained in any job.

All these variables are to be found on CARD 5.

The code sheet for grading is identical to that used for the fathers in 1961 (P. app. 1)

We felt however, that although the Hall Jones gave us a standard method of grading occupations, it was not detailed enough, and did not encompass female occupations. We therefore devised our own system based partly on the Hall Jones which is far more descriptive and less orientated towards grading for social classes. The listing of occupations can be found in "Type of Jobs" - Appendix 1.

Each ~~grade~~ occupation occupies three columns. The first column (0 to ~~4~~ 5) gives the most general division.

- 0 = High status non - manual owners and managers
- 1 = High to medium grades of professional non-manual
- 2 = Skilled service and manual occupations
- 3 = 2 continued.
- 4 = Semi skilled and unskilled manual and non manual.
- 5 = Services/Armed forces.

The second column is subdivisions of each of the main types listed above. The third column is a specific job type within each subdivision.

This system is applicable to both sexes

Three variables use the above coding

- 1) JOBITYP type of first job
 - 2) LATJTYP type of latest or last job
 - 3) JOBTYPSP type of job of spouse (CARD 5)

Includes all offences committed by a person, including driving and minor offences. To obtain only serious indicatble offences a new variable must be created which subtracts MOTMINOR, MISCMINOR, POLITIC from total offences. Possibly also ~~MI~~ MOTSER. (card 8)

NOROAD, NOHOME, NOWORK (card 7) are ~~x~~ deduced number of road, home or work accidents (sport accidents counted as home). Where an accident occurred but could not be allocated into any of these specific categories, it was coded as 9 for all three. To obtain the true number of accidents there are two possible methods

AND

- 1) IF (NOROAD EQ 9 ~~OR~~ NOHOME EQ 9 AND NOWORK EQ 9) ACC=1
- IF (NOROAD NE 9 AND NOHOME NE 9 AND NOWORK NE 9) ACC=NOROAD+NOHOME+NOWORK

 (There is no need to specify hospital fractures, burns and poisonings as they ~~are~~ usually required after care : clinics)

Hospital admissions and complaints includes normal childbirth in women. The number of normal child births in hospital (HNORMCH must be subtracted from TOTCOMP and TOTADM to obtain admissions in hospital for sickness.
