



1. The Study

In 1963, at Nuffield College, Oxford, the British Election Study was established and has since carried out the major survey of all the following General Elections in Britain. In 1974 the British Election Study moved to the University of Essex and it was decided, for the Election of October 1974, to set up a special Scottish survey so that Scotland could be studied in more depth than was possible in the British survey. These two surveys, along with the Welsh Election Study based at the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth, work in close conjunction with each other.

The surveys all aim to study the political attitudes and behaviour of the electorate, and the Scottish survey focusses, of course, on matters of particular interest to Scotland. The findings of the surveys are published in the form of books and/or articles.

2. Instructions to interviewers on the questionnaire

These instructions, which should not be read aloud, are distinguished by being printed in BLOCK CAPITALS.

3. <u>'It depends'</u>

On questions such as 2e, about Welfare benefits, the respondent may say that it depends on which Welfare benefits you mean; or at 39a, about how good a job the trade unions are doing for the country as a whole, the respondent may say that it depends on the Union: in such cases you always say 'in general' or 'overall' or some such prompt. Always try to get the respondent away from a 'Depends' answer and if this is not possible use the Comments line to write down what the respondent said.

4. 'Don't know'

In general, try to avoid don't know answers.

5. Comments line

Armost all of the questions have a comments line below them. Use this to write down any comments which the respondent may give or any comments of your own which may be useful, for example if the respondent was particularly confused or needed a lot of help (perhaps re-reading the questions or the Show Card several times). Please overuse the comments line rather than risk underusing it!

6. Show Cards

The show cards are labelled from A to W. The letter of the card is marked clearly on both the card and the questionnaire, along with instructions about when to show and when to retrieve the card. The wording on the cards is reproduced verbatim on the questionnaire with one exception - card U, used at question 56 says 'you have..., you were...' etc. on the questionnaire and 'I have..., I was' etc. on the card itself. The questionnaire is clearly marked on those occasions when you are supposed to read out the options on the card to the respondent. Do not read out the card except when so instructed unless it is absolutely necessary, in which case put a note to this effect on the comments line. Once you have read out a show card as instructed, you may re-read it to the respondent as many times as necessary.

Q.1 Write <u>full</u> name of newspaper, that is 'Greenock Telegraph' not just 'Telegraph'; 'Daily Telegraph' not just 'Telegraph. If the national Times newspaper is mentioned please write 'London Times' so that we can be sure that this is the paper that is meant. Probe if necessary for full title.

Q.2a-f As instructed on the questionnaire, read out options I to 5 but not 'Depends' or 'DK'. Here, as elsewhere in the questionnaire, the responses which must not be read out are indented.

Q.2b The codes are re-printed for your convenience: they do not have to be read out (hence no READ OUT statement). If the respondent has any difficulty you may read out the responses if you think that this will help.

Q.3a The respondent may say that it depends on what the death penalty is being brought back for. Try to get an overall answer and explain the respondent's reservations on the comments line. Likewise, they may say that it depends on the form of capital punishment - again, try for an overall answer and note the respondent's comments on the comments line.

Q.4 If the respondent just says 'No/Nothing' etc. when you ask the question repeat the question stressing the word anything and omitting the words 'in particular'.

If the respondent starts telling you what he <u>dislikes</u> about the Conservative Party <u>do not stop him</u> and write the responses down just as the respondent gives them, making it clear whether a particular response is a like or a dislike (for any ambiguous statement write (L) if it is a like and (D) if it is a dislike. When you get to question 5 ask if there is anything else which they dislike about the Conservative Party. Do not try to sort the likes out from the dislikes (except by marking clearly which is which): the coders will do that.

If the respondent gives no likes and immediately starts telling you about dislikes, note down all that he says and then repeat question 4 stressing the word anything and omitting the words 'in particular'.

The instructions for question 4 apply to all the questions about the likes and dislikes of the parties (Qs 5,6,7,9 and 10).

After Q.9 Do not fill in the grid headed DECK 2. There are five other such grids in the questionnaire and these are for the use of the coders, not yourselves.

Q.15 CODE ONE ONLY. Always code only one answer unless specifically instructed otherwise.

Q.19 Note the respondent's exact response e.g. 'John Callaghan', 'the Chancellor of the Exchequer', 'that extreme left-winger' etc.

Even if the respondent does not know the name of the person ask him if he knows the party the person belongs to.

You may abbreviate party names to Con, SNP, or SLP but write anything else in full (especially Liberal and Labour).

If the respondent changes his mind about an answer or adds an answer where he had originally said 'don't know' you should change the original response provided that you have not yet left Q.19. Do not change an answer once you have started Q.20.

Q.21c We are talking about a totally independent Scotland, not Devolution or any other such arrangement. This applies to all the questions which say 'independent Scotland'.

Q.27a 'Income' includes any income e.g. grants, pensions, social security, shares, housekeeping money etc. and is as the respondent himself interprets it.

Q.29b 'Next few years' is as the respondent interprets it.

Q.30a This question needs some explanation. If the respondent did vote you will then ask the "IF YES" question and ring code 1 or 2 as appropriate. If the respondent did not vote you will then ask the "IF NO" question and ring code 3,4,or 5 as appropriate.

Q.33 If the respondent gives more than one answer, be careful to see that you get them in the order of importance to the respondent. DO NOT PROBE for more than one answer (as instructed on the questionnaire)

Q.36a Again, we mean total independence, not Devolution etc.

Q.40b Note full name of Union, not just initials. If full name not known get as much information as you can (initials, job of person, etc.). If in doubt as to whether anything counts as a trade union or not, include it - we can always edit it out later:

Q.42a This is a question which is to be interpreted by the respondent. We are not talking about the Chief Wage Earner as defined by market research, nor the Household as defined by market research.

If no-one in the household as defined by the respondent is working code as "None" (9) and go to Q.43a.

Q.43b If necessary, follow the same format as in Q. 43a; that is, ask which statement in the boxes comes closest to the view of the party and then how strongly they think the party holds that view.

Q.44 In this case we only want spontaneous answers: do not probe at all.

 $\underline{\text{Q.47}}$ You may ring two answers here (but no more). If only one answer given probe for a second.

Q.49a If the respondent has not heard of any of these people write 'NOT KNOWN' on the line. Do not tell them anything about the person.

Q.50b - 54a Write the names of other parties in sufficient detail such that we know whether the respondent meant, for example, the Scottish Labour Party or the national Labour Party, the Scottish National Party or the British National Party.

If Respondent was too young to vote write in 'Too young to vote'. If necessary probe: 'Were you old enough to vote in the Election?'

Q.58b If name only of the candidate is given, write this name down and find out which Party (s)he stood for or whether (s)he was an independent.

Q.66c A "single" answer means only one nationality stated at 66a or b,i.e. not for example "Scottish and British". If you can only get such a combination answer, go to the next question (67a).

Q.73b By 'full-time education' we mean just that: i.e. not part-time education nor full-time training.

If respondent still in full-time education, assume that they will pass all their examinations and ask what age they will then be when they finish. $\underline{Q.86}$ If respondent is married, modify the question to "your husband/your wife".

If Respondent is HOH and not married write this on the questionnaire and go to Q.95a (as instructed).

Q.95a We only want to know about respondents own children, including adopted children but not foster children. We are also only interested in children still living in the respondent thousehold.
