

THE BRITISH ELECTION STUDY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ESSEX

INTRODUCTION

The British Election Study has three general aims: (a) the provision of an accurate, comprehensive, historical record of the attitudes and behaviour of the British electorate at the General Elections; (b) the study of long-term political and electoral change in Britain, and (c) the continued accumulation of a data archive on the political attitudes and behaviour of the British electorate over time for the benefit of the academic community at large.

After the General Elections of February and October 1974 the British Election Study conducted four interview surveys. These surveys established five separate samples of electors: (1) a sample interviewed after the elections of June 1970 and February 1974; (2) a representative crosssection sample interviewed after the election of February 1974; (3) a representative cross-section sample interviewed after the election of October 1974, (4) a panel sample interviewed after both the 1974 elections, (5) a special Scottish sample interviewed after the election of October 1974. A total of almost 5,000 individuals is involved in all these samples.

Among the specific themes explored were: the magnitude and causes of the erosion of enduring support for the two major parties, the changing relationship between social stratification and electoral behaviour; and changes in the support secured by the major parties as a result of short-term factors, especially issues.

In conjunction with the election studies the Essex team also conducted a postal survey after the Referendum in June 1975.

The 1970 - February 1974 Panel Survey

The sample for this survey was inherited from the 1970 Butler and Stokes election study. Originally 80 constituencies had been selected with probability proportionate to size of electorate from a list of 613 constituencies throughout Great Britain (excluding Northern Ireland and constituencies north of the Caledonian Canal). The list was stratified by region and by whether the constituencies were in urban or rural areas. Electors' names and addresses were drawn from the 1969/70 electoral registers of each of the selected constituencies. The samples for this survey included the names and addresses of those who were interviewed in 1970, of whom about half had also been interviewed in 1969. It excluded those who had been interviewed in 1969 and who had moved out of the constituency between then and the 1970 wave of interview. The total sample issue list for this survey contained 1,816 names. Initially the intention was to follow up and interview only named respondents at their original addresses. Over three and a half years since the previous wave of interviews it was expected that some 35% of the sample would have moved away or died. In fact 1,246 named individuals were found to be living at their 1970 address. Subsequently it was decided to contact and interview respondents who had moved locally. This raised the number of named individuals contacted to 1,414. Of these interviews were obtained with 1,096 respondents.

Because the sample consisted of people who had been interviewed previously and because the main intention of the study was to provide information about how opinions and behaviour had changed since the previous election, the subject matter of the questionnaire owed much to the questionnaires used in the earlier waves of 1969 and 1970. The questionnaire began with a short section of questions about newspaper readership, politics and the media, followed by a series of open-ended questions probing respondents' likes and dislikes of the political parties, including the Scottish National Party in Scotland and Plaid Cymru in Wales. Respondents were asked to contrast the parties' standpoints and to evaluate differences between them. This was followed by questions on the election result and its impact and about the extent to which the facts about issues had been provided. Ten issues were covered in the following section rising prices, strikes, and the miners' strike in particular, taxation, the Common Market, pensions and social security, immigration, trade union power, big business power, nationalisation, and control of wages and salarnes. On the major issues five aspects were examined: the respondent's own view on what should happen, his view of how

the parties stood on the issue, the importance of the issue in his voting decision, his assessment of how well he understood the issue, and the party he preferred on the issue. On some issues, where there was thought to be a public consensus on what was desirable, for example, rising prices, only the last three aspects were examined. Following sections covered voting behaviour at the General Election, party identification and an overall assessment of the main political parties and the party leaders. General questions were then asked about the respondent's economic circumstances and expectations together with questions concerning trade union membership and social class identification. The questionnaire was concluded with a number of questions on tenure, occupation of respondent, mobility, marital status and income. The questionnaire took on average some 45 to 50 minutes to complete. Fieldwork for this survey was conducted by Social and Community Planning Research. Interviewers were briefed by members of the Essex team and SCPR executives jointly. The briefings were carried out in the week after the February election and interviewing began on 6 March. Most of the interviewing was completed within one month.

The February 1974 cross-section survey

For the second February 1974 survey a new sample of electors was drawn from the electoral register published in that month. For this sample 200 parliamentary constituencies were selected with probability proportionate to size of the 1973 electorate from a list of 618 constituencies throughout Great Britain (again excluding constituencies north of the Caledonian Canal). All 618 constituencies were stratified into eleven regional strata using the Registrar General's standard region definitions and treating Greater London as a separate region. Within these strata constituencies were divided into three groups, those in conurbations, those in urban areas, and those in rural areas, according to the proportion of that constituency's population that lived in each of these types of local authority areas. Finally the constituencies in these strata were arranged in descending order of the percentage of the Labour vote at the 1970 General Election. From this list of 618, 200 were selected systematically within regional group with probability proportionate to the size of the 1973 electorate. Within each of the 200 selected constituencies one polling district was selected, again

with probability proportionate to size. This yielded a set of 200 polling districts as sampling units. For the February cross-section study individual electors were drawn within polling districts, in each case using a random start point and sampling fraction necessary to generate seventeen names. This gave a sample 3,400 electors representative of the eligible electorate on 28 February 1974. Whenever one of these had moved since the compilation of the electoral register in October 1973, interviewers were instructed to try to obtain the new address. Interviews were attempted with all those for whom new addresses were established within the 200 constituencies covered by the survey. In all, 2,462 interviews were completed.

The questionnaire used for the February 1974 cross-section survey was similar in many respects to that used in the 1970 - 74 panel study. There were however important differences between the two, since there was less concern with the cross-section study of repeating questions in precisely the same form or, indeed, on the same topic as for the panel study. For example, while it was felt useful for panel analysis to repeat many of the questions on immigration which Butler and Stokes had asked in 1970, when immigration was a major electoral issue, this issue was not covered in the cross-section survey, since it did not figure prominently in the February election. On the other hand, more attention could be focussed on those issues which were important in February 1974. For example, more detailed questions were asked about the mners' strike, rising prices, and devolution. There were also open-ended questions about what changes would result from the election and about the relative power of groups within British society. Also more attention was focussed on respondents' images of the parties, together with their general satisfaction with the political and social environment. The questionnaire was rather longer than that used in the panel survey and the average interview time was 70 minutes.

Fieldwork on the cross-section survey was carried out by the British Market Research Bureau. Interviewers were briefed jointly by a BMRB executive and a member of the Essex team between 7 and 30 March 1974. The main fieldwork took place between 8 March and 13 April 1974. A report, a re-writing of the article which appeared in <u>New Society</u>, 'The Why and How of the February Voting', was subsequently sent to all those respondents who requested information about the survey's findings.

The October 1974 cross-section survey

The October 1974 sample was an updated version of that used in February. To update it, four further names were selected in each of the 200 polling districts by using a random start point and deriving the appropriate sampling interval. The original seventeen names were not replaced. In all, 4,200 names were provided in 200 polling districts. In the February 1974 cross-section survey contact had been attempted with 3,400 electors. Two thousand four hundred and sixty-two of these were successfully interviewed and 938, for various reasons, were not. In generating the effective sample for the October study all the contact sheets for non-respondents were studied and individuals with whom it was felt no interview was possible were excluded from the sample. Reasons for exclusion included ascertained death, inability to trace, outright refusal to be interviewed, and so on. Seven hundred and eighty nine individuals were thus excluded, leaving 149 names for issue in the October sample. In summary the issued sample in October was made up of three groups of individuals; there were 2,462 electors who had been interviewed after the February study ('A' series), 800 new electors whose names had been freshly drawn for October ('B' series), 149 electors whose names had been drawn in February who had not been interviewed then but who might be available in October ('B' series). This gave an effective sample of 3,411 electors in 200 constituencies. Three thousand two hundred and eight of these were contacted and interviews completed with 2,365.

Two colour-coded versions of the questionnaire were used. Series 'A' respondents, those who had been interviewed after the February election, were given a shorter version lasting, on average, 65 minutes. Series 'B' respondents, those who had not been previously interviewed, were asked to answer a longer questionnaire, lasting about 90 minutes. The shorter questionnaire another of background questions which had been asked of the 'A' series respondents only eight months previously and the answers to which were unlikely to have changed during that period.

The 'B' series questionnaire began with a short selection of questions about newspaper readership, politics and the media and the October election campaign. The next section in both the October versions consisted of openended questions probing the respondents' likes and dislikes about the major political parties, including the Scottish National Party in Scotland. This

was followed by a series of questions designed to tap by means of semantic differentials respondents' images of the Conservative, Labour, and Liberal Parties. In the next section ten issues were covered. Eight issues were common to both February and October. rising prices, strikes, pensions, membership of the Common Market, nationalisation, social services, and wage controls. New issues in October were unemployment, housing, and North Sea oil. In general the same five aspects of issues which had been covered in the February surveys were examined. This section on major issues was followed by two series of questions that had no equivalents in the spring surveys. The first evaluated respondents' political positions on a liberalconservative scale by asking for their reaction to specific changes that had been taking place in Britain, such as attempts to ensure equality for women and for coloured people, tighter police control of demonstrations, the reduction in Britain's military strength, etc.. The second series, on a similar theme, asked how much importance respondents felt should be attached to policies such as the establishment of comprehensive schools, reparriation and and to developing countries. These two series of questions were followed by questions on the most important general aim of government and two questions on how much confidence could be placed on the parties' general handling of the problems of governments.

The following section covered voting behaviour at the General Election and political interest together with a new series of questions examining strategic voting. This led on to a section on general party support followed by questions probing respondents' attitudes to coalitions as an issue in their voting choice, followed by assessments of the main political parties and their leaders together with a section on political party membership, interest group involvement and awareness of the winning parties and candidates' names. These were followed by questions on the respondents' financial circumstances and expectations and a section on social indicators in which respondents were asked how satisfied they were with their lives, jobs, politicians in Britain today, and so on. For those interviewed for the first time in October the penultimate section consisted of questions about trade union membership, social class identification, party affiliation of respondent's father, educational background and so on. Finally occupation, marital status, income and date of birth were asked of all respondents together with new questions on religious affiliation and the number and age of children in the household. Fieldwork for this survey was conducted by Social and Community

Planning Research. Interviewer briefings chaired by SCPR researchers and members of the British Election Study team were conducted in the week following the General Election. Interviewing began immediately after the briefing sessions. Throughout it was assumed that movers would be followed and interviewed where possible. Over 90% of all interviews had been conducted by 20 December 1974. Most of these took place in the first month after the election.

The February - October 1974 Panel Survey

The 1974 cross-section surveys continued the pattern established by the Michigan Studies in the United States and by Butler and Stokes in Britain of combining cross-section surveys with panel elements. Those interviewed in the February cross-section survey who were subsequently interviewed after the October election, that is the October 'A' series respondents, produced a new 1974 panel sample. Since the details of sampling, questionnaire construction and fieldwork given for the cross-section surveys also apply to these panel elements, little more need be said of this study. Of the 2,467 respondents interviewed in February 2,359 were subsequently contacted after the October election and of these 1,830 were interviewed.

The Scottish Study

The October 1974 Scottish Study was made necessary by the special and fastchanging pattern of Scottish electoral politics and by the February election results in particular. In that election none of the regions deviated more sharply from the average than Scotland. The fact that seven seats were won by the SNP, six for the first time; that the SNP's average poll was 22%, slightly above that of the Liberals even in England alone; that the Conservative and Labour parties secured their lowest proportion of the poll in Scotland since 1918 and 1931 respectively and that they failed to come first and second in thirty-one out of seventy-one constituencies, all seemed to warrant a special study of electoral behaviour in Scotland and it was felt that a British Election Study which failed to take account of these

changes through lack of sample size would rightly be the object of both academic and political criticism. For the Scottish Study the investigators enjoyed the support and collaboration of Dr. William Miller of the University of Strathclyde.

To avoid having to draw a sample of constituencies and polling districts in Scotland completely independent of the Scottish element of the British crosssection sample, a sample design was sought that would allow the latter to provide data for both the British cross-section sample and for a Scottish cross-section sample, even if the data had to be weighted. The design adopted was as follows. all seventy-one Scottish constituencies, including on this occasion those north of the Caledonian Canal and which previously as in most British surveys were excluded for reasons of interviewer cost, were divided into three main strata according to area type. Conurbation constituencies (including those twenty contiguous constituencies forming the Clydeside conurbation), rural constituencies (those twenty that lacked a substantial urban settlement), and the remaining thirty-one constituencies, which were treated as urban. The conurbation and rural constituencies were then each divided into two strata according to the relative strength of the Labour vote at the February 1974 election. The urban constituencies were divided into three groups using the same criterion. Within each of the seven strata constituencies were listed in order of the proportion voting Liberal or Nationalist at the previous election. Electorates were accumulated within each stratum and a sampling interval calculated so as to provide five constituencies per stratum. A start point was selected such that all Scottish constituencies already in the British cross-section sample were included in this booster sample. Constituencies were then drawn with probability proportionate to size. The selected thirty-five constituencies consisted of eighteen constituencies in the British cross-section sample and seventeen new constituencies. In the original eighteen constituencies the ward containing the polling district sampled in February was used as a base and a second polling district in that ward was chosen with probability proportionate to size. In the seventeen added constituencies a ward was selected and then two polling districts within it were selected with probability proportionate to size. A set of seventy secondary sampling units were derived, eighteen of which lay in the British cross-section sample. One thousand three hundred and ninety electors were chosen by selecting five further names at random in

the eighteen polling districts belonging to the cross-section sample and twenty-five names at random in the other fifty-two polling districts. These electors were asked a third version of the October questionnaire and were labelled the 'C' series. In summary, the effective overall sample in Scotland was 1,704 electors. These included 234 who had been interviewed after the February election ('A' series), 73 electors whose names had been freshly drawn for the October study as part of the British cross-section sample ('B' series), seven electors whose names had been drawn in February but had not been interviewed then but who might have been available in October ('B' series), 1,390 of the Scottish booster sample ('C' series). Because the seven strata contained different numbers of electors and because an equal number of constituencies was selected in each, the final sample design was a disproportionate stratified clustered sample. Weights need to be applied to off-set the effect of different sampling fractions in drawing primary sampling points in each of the seven master strata and weights are also required to compensate for differing probabilities of selection between the two types of polling district described. Of the 1,704 names issued 1,542 individuals were contacted and completed interviews obtained with 1,170 respondents.

For 'A' and 'B' series respondents in Scotland the same questionnaires were used as in the rest of the British cross-section study. The third colour coded version of the questionnaire used for the 'C' sample was similar in content to that used for 'B' series respondents. However it included a small number of questions of special relevance to Scottish issues, for example on devolution, North Sea oil, religious segregation in schools and the Scottish Assembly, which were either not covered in the other two versions of the questionnaire or were dealt with less fully. For reasons of space certain other issues had to be excluded from the 'C' series questionnaire. Fieldwork for the Scottish Study was organised alongside the main crosssection survey and was conducted by Social and Community Planning Research.

The Referendum Survey, June 1975

The Referendum study sample consisted of all those individuals previously interviewed after the October 1974 election. The survey thus formed a second or third panel wave for all respondents, depending on whether they had been interviewed after the February 1974 election.

The mail questionnaire used was very brief. In addition to questions relating to voting in the Referendum it contained mainly questions which were directly or indirectly linked to opinion questions about the EEC asked in the previous election studies. Questionnaires were mailed on the day of the Referendum. Two subsequent reminder letters were sent to non-respondents. Finally an interview follow-up employing the same questionnaire was used to contact those who had still not responded. The mail survey was administered by the project staff at Essex and the Social Science Unit of National Opinion Polls Market Research Limited conducted the interview follow-up. Eighty percent of the sample responded by mail; a further ten percent completed telephone or personal interviews.

The next Election Study

Preparation for surveys to be conducted immediately after the next general election is already in progress.

There will be two surveys: a UK cross-section survey which will include reinterviews with respondents from the February and October 1974 surveys; and a Scottish cross-section survey which will include reinterviews with respondents from the 'C' series in October 1974. The main responsibility for organising the fieldwork and analysis of the Scottish survey will rest with Drs Jack Brand and William Miller of the University of Strathclyde. In addition the project will be co-ordinated with the forthcoming postelection survey of Wales to be undertaken by Mr. Denis Balsom and Dr. Peter Madgwick at the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth.

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Publications

The main findings of the 1974 surveys have been reported in a number of papers and articles written by members of the Election Study team. A current list of these appears on page 14. Work is also in progress on a book to be co-authored by the investigators and J. Alt to be published by Cambridge University Press.

Papers analysing the survey results have been presented by members of the team in seminars at a number of British and American universities. In addition we have participated in conferences organised by a number of national and international bodies concerned with disseminating the results of political and social science research - notably the International Political Science Association, the British Political Science Association, the American Political Science Association, the European Consortium for Political Research, the Royal Statistical Society, and the SSRC.

In accordance with the condition of the grant all the data from the 1974 surveys has been deposited with the SSRC Survey Archive.

The Election Study's resources and data have also been made available to a number of students engaged in postgraduate dissertations and theses at Essex as well as to students of the ECPR Summer School in Data Analysis.

In addition, James Alt, formerly Chief Research Officer on the project, has completed a PhD dissertation entitled 'The Politics of Economic Decline', portions of which are based on Election Study data. The dissertation, which is also expected to appear as a book some time in 1978, deals with a wide range of topics in the general area of empirical political economy.
