The British General Election Study 1983 Continuity Guide utilises information collated by the British Election Study at the University of Essex and presented in Technical Paper 1981 2 Questionnaire Continuity Guide Technical Paper 1981 2 contains the texts of questionnaires from surveys held between 1963 and 1979 inclusive A number of errors and some omissions have been found in the Technical Paper, and there may be others which we have not noticed. Users of this Continuity Guide are strongly advised to check the codebooks and questionnaires for the individual studies concerned.

A previous election study is referred to by the year in which the interview survey took place, followed by the relevant question number and, in some instances, a symbol. The symbol signifies a variation in the wording of the question. A key to the symbols is given below. The symbols that appear in the guide are consistent with those used in Technical Paper 1981.2 Questionnaire Continuity Guide produced by the British Election Study at the University of Essex.

Key to Symbols

- slight textual variation in question wording in different years
- + asked of random half sample
- * indicates that the question was asked of some but not all of respondents in the 1970 surveys, and the question number refers to a question asked as part of the Panel series which ended in 1970.
- SW asked only in Scotland and Wales in February 1974 surveys
- A asked only of 'A' series respondents in October 1974 surveys
- B asked only of 'B' series respondents in October 1974 surveys
- C asked only of 'C' series respondents in October 1974 surveys. The October 1974 study designated questionnaires as types 'A', 'B', and 'C' type 'A' was used for respondents in the cross-section sample who had been interviewed in the February 1974 survey; type 'B' was used with the cross-section sample who had not been interviewed in the February 1974 survey, type 'C' was used with a special booster sample in Scotland.

BRITISH GENERAL ELECTION STUDY 1983

Technical Details of The Survey

The study was a joint project between investigators at Orford University and Social and Community Planning Research, London. The project Directors were A.F. Heath, R.M. Jowell, J.K. Curtice and E.J. Field.

Sample Design

The survey was designed to yield a representative sample of eligible voters in Great Britain at the time of the 1983 general election. As with previous surveys in the series, electors in Northern Ireland and the Scottish Highlands and Islands were excluded from the sampling frame.

1 Selection of Farliamentary Constituencies

250 constituencies were selected with probability proportionate to size of electorate. Prior to selection the list of constituencies was stratified by percentage Labour vote in the 1979 general election, within three population density bands (10+, 3.1-9.9, and 3 or fewer persons per hectare) within Registrar General's standard regions (pre-1974 boundaries). In order to carry out fieldwork very soon after the election, sampling had to be carried out in the weeks before it. During that time, many electoral registration officers were still incorporating the constituency boundary changes (legislated for only in March 1983) into suitable voting lists. In view also of the extremely short period within which we had to mount the study, we decided to sample from the old constituency lists (which were already available in Social and Community Planning Research's computer file) and, at the data processing stage, to transfer the selected polling districts into their new constituencies. The computer tape therefore contains details of both the new and the old constituencies.

2 Selection of Polling Districts

Within each selected constituency one polling district was selected, again with probability proportionate to electorate. Folling districts within each constituency were ordered according to the register's ordering, and any

polling district with fewer than 500 electors was combined with the one following it to form one potential selection unit.

3 Selection of Individuals

Within each selected polling district a systematic random sample of 24 electors was selected with equal probability. Any of the selected electors who turned out to be ineligible to vote in the general election (peers and 17 year-olds whose 18th birthday was later than 9 June) were deleted and replaced (using random number tables) by another name.

A sample of 6000 names was selected; this figure was considered to be viable in order to achieve around 4000 interviews. Since no substitution could be allowed, the issued sample had to be large enough to allow for losses through death or emigration, or movement to new addresses that could not be traced or followed up. It was estimated that around 85-90 per cent of the issued sample would still be resident at their registered addresses at the time of the fieldwork. Most of the remainder (except for those movers whom interviewers would be able to trace to their new addresses) would be out of the interviewers' scope. Then there would be further losses through refusals, temporary absences, noncontacts, illness or incapacity. The actual distribution of response is shown in Table I.1A below.

Fieldwork and Response

Having undertaken a small pretest of the questionnaire between 9 June (election day) and 16 June, fieldwork was carried out by 139 Social and Community Planning Research interviewers between 5 July and 5 October 1983. 73 per cent of the interviews were undertaken in the month of July, and 93 per cent were completed within 12 weeks of the election — a comparable proportion and period to those achieved in previous election studies.

Where it was felt that a further attempt to locate or persuade potential respondents to participate might be fruitful, their names were reissued to interviewers during the later phases of fieldwork. 1123 names were reissued, and 382 (34 per cent) were converted successfully, raising overall response by some 7 per cent to 72.4 per cent. The overall response summary is shown in Table I.1A.

Sample Characteristics and Weighting Adjustments

Selection biases in a sample may arise from three main sources.

- 1 Nonrandom selection. Since each elector was given the same, known, nonzero probability of selection in the survey, potential dias from this source can effectively be ruled out.
- 2 Sampling frame deficiencies, in particular the omission or duplication of parts of the population. Since the electoral registers (by definition) include all those eligible to vote, no potential voter was omitted from the frame. The fact that some electors (very few) are included more than once in the registers is not of concern with a sample of this size and distribution.
- 3 Differential response. Some kinds of people may be cooperative or available than others, leading them to be represented disproportionately in the achieved sample. If respondents differ from nonrespondents with respect to the survey variables, the estimates based on the achieved sample will be brased. Such potential bras needs to be investigated and, if appropriate, corrected.

Adjustments for nonresponse bias are appropriate if they are based on reliable data showing discrepancies between the characteristics of respondents and nonrespondents. Such information is often difficult to find.

The most direct way of finding out the characteristics of nonrespondents so as to compare them with those of respondents is through the sampling frame itself. Some frames attach details to the names they contain allowing basic characteristics of non-respondents to be ascertained, but the electoral registers contain no such data. They do, however, contain geographical information which allows a reliable examination of response rates by area.

In common with most national surveys, this survey experienced considerable variation in response rate by region, ranging from 80 per cent in Scotland to 63 per cent in Greater London. The data were therefore weighted to correct the regional imbalances (and these weights have been included on the data tape). The weights are shown in Table I.2A, and range from .905 in Scotland to 1.168 in Greater London.

These adjustments do not, of course, eliminate potential nonresponse bias. For that to happen, nonrespondents in

each region would have to be a random subset of the total sample in that region with respect to the survey variables - which is very unlikely. Nonetheless the regional adjustments help to mitigate potential biases.

A less direct way of redressing nonresponse bias is to compare the sample's characteristics with those of the population it seeks to represent. Thus a general population sample can usefully be compared with, say, 1981 Census data or the latest available General Household Survey data. Major discrepancies in sample composition can then be reduced by weighting.

In election surveys, however, the purpose is not to reflect the characteristics of the population as a whole but those of the electorate - a group about whom very little demographic information is directly available. electoral registers explicitly exclude some people whom the Census includes, such as those who are ineligible to vote for one reason or another. But they also exclude people who are technically eligible but fail to register. Moreover, as Todd and Butcher (1983) have noted, underregistration is much more prevalent among some groups (such as ethnic minorities) than among others. So there are several important differences between the electorate and the population. Comparisons between our sample's characteristics and national characteristics may be instructive (some are shown in Table I.GA), but any conclusions to be drawn from them were always likely to be too tentative to encourage us to base weighting adjustments upon them. In the event, no further weighting (other than the regional weights) was undertaken.

Few discrepancies emerge from the figures in Table I.3A. There is an apparent slight tendency of the sample to overrepresent 25-44 year-olds and to underrepresent those over 60. But the age distributions are fairly close and actually conceal biases that our own supplementary data suggest may exist. Interviewers were asked to record, where possible, the sex and approximate age of certain categories of nonrespondents (principally 'refusers' with whom contact was made but no interview achieved). Around one in three of these non-respondents were elderly, compared with around one in five respondents, which seems to be a very large discrepancy not reflected in the overall age profile.

The explanation appears to be that no recorded age estimates are available for untraceable movers, leading to their omission from the base on which the calculation above (one in three elderly nonrespondents) was made. Since movers are likely to be younger than non-movers, as the age profile of traceable movers in the sample confirms, young people are underrepresented in these calculations.

It appears, therefore, that two compensating biases - refusals among the older age groups and noncontact among the younger age groups - have resulted in an age profile that is close to that of the 1981 Census.

Most importantly, the occupational profile of the threequarters of our sample who were economically active or retired as defined by the census is very similar to that of the 1981 Census. There is at most a slight suggestion of an overrepresentation of those in nonmanual occupations (in particular socio-economic groups 1 and 5.1) at the expense of those in manual occupations (in particular socio-economic group 9).

As important for an election survey as demographic comparisons are political comparisons. As Table I.4A shows the reported voting figures in our survey were close to the actual voting figures, with a slight tendency for our sample to report having voted Conservative at the expense of the Alliance.

The discrepancy between the reported vote of survey respondents and the official result may have been due, in part, to a tendency for respondents to claim to have voted for the winning side when they did not (particularly perhaps among those respondents who did not vote but claimed to have done so).

A more substantial discrepancy lies in reported turnout. 83.4 per cent of the sample reported having voted while the official turnout figure for the 1983 general election was 72.7 per cent. It is improbable, however, that this discrepancy simply reflects an overreport of turnout by respondents. Various other factors help to explain the difference between the sample's reported turnout and the official turnout.

First, as noted earlier, movers (and particularly nonlocal movers) are underrepresented in the sample and are also less likely to have voted. Second, abstainers are more likely than voters to have refused cooperation in an election survey, since as a group they may well be relatively applitical, or at least resistant to being questioned about an event in which they did not actively participate. So abstainers, for one reason or another, are almost certainly underrepresented in the sample.

Moreover, the discrepancy between official turnout figures and those based on survey estimates is exacerbated by legitimate and illegitimate double-entries in the registers. For instance, people with two homes often appear twice, as

do movers; the names of people who died may not have been removed from the registers.

We estimate tentatively that if turnout is recalculated allowing for the (calculable) factors we have referred to, overclaiming would be reduced to about 4 per cent.

#### Note I

### Constituencies Sampled

#### Note II

### Census Ward Codes

This code identifies the local authority ward in which the respondent lives. It is based on the coding scheme of wards used in the production of 1981 Census statistics by OPCS and GRO(S), and is designed to enable users of the data set to match for each respondent information from the 1981 Census on the ward in which respondents were living.

The coding schemes for England and Wales, and for Scotland are separate. The English and Welsh scheme is a four digit letter code. Details of the coding scheme are to be found in 1981 Census User Guide 2 available from OPCS. The Scottish code is a five letter numeric code. Details of its construction can be obtained from GRO(S).

The local authority wards used in England and Wales are those that were in existence on census day 1981. In some cases local authority ward boundaries were revised between 1981 and the time of the creation of the 1983 electoral register from which the sample was drawn. These codes were identified on the basis of information supplied by OPCS and details of the ward in which each of the polling districts concerned was located in 1981 were obtained from the relevant local authority.

The local authority wards used in Scotland are those that were used in the district council elections in May 1984. Again, in some cases, these differ from those used in the creation of the 1983 electoral register. These were identified from details of the schedule of ward boundary changes published in J Bochel and D Denver, The Scottish District Elections 1980 (Dundee: University of Dundee, 1980), and information on the 1984 wards in which each polling district was placed was obtained from the relevant regional council.

It should be noted that in acquiring information from each local authority, an attempt was only made to obtain information on the ward within which each polling district lay. In a small number of cases a polling district lay in more than one ward in 1981/4. In such cases no attempt was made to identify in which of the wards each of the respondents lay; the ward code only identifies the ward in which the largest portion of the polling district covered in the sample lay.

#### Note III

### Occupational and Class Data

Each occupation on which imformation was collected is coded according to the 1980 Classification of Occupations (HMSO, 1980) and to the 1970 Classification of Occupations (HMSO, 1970).

Note, however, that in the case of the 1980 scheme, the representation of occupation group differs from the practice in the 1980 Classification of Occupations. All codes ending in .1 to .9 are represented as .01 to .09. Codes -.1 and -.2 are represented as 999.01 and 999.02. This affects variables Q48A1, Q53Ai and Q55A1.

The Goldthorpe-Llewellyn class schema is based on the 1970 classification. For further details of its construction see J Goldthorpe, Social Mobility and Class Structure in Modern Britain (Oxford. Clarendon Press, 1980) and J Goldthorpe and K Hope, The Social Grading of Occupations (Oxford: Clarendon Press, 1974).

The Goldthorpe-Heath class schema is a revision of the Goldthorpe-Llewellyn classification which makes use of the increased precision of the 1980 classification. Further details of its construction are available from the authors.

The industry class (Q48F, Q53G, Q55G) uses the coding scheme of the Standard Industrial Classification: Revised 1980 (HMSO, 1979).

#### Note IV

### Noughts with Multiple Meaning

There are a number of variable where noughts can arise for a number of different reasons. Users of the data set may, in certain circumstances, wish to recode the data in order to distinguish between these different reasons.

### 1 Multi-coded 'close-ended' questions

- Q2H There are four reasons for a nought.
  - (a) Q2H skipped (ie Q2G not equal 1, or respondent lives outside Scotland/Wales (as appropriate) in the case of Q2H6 and Q2H7).
  - (b) That particular party did not call, and respondent was able to name at least one other party that did.
  - (c) Respondent unable to recall party(ies) of canvasser(s) (ie Q2H8 equal 2).
  - (d) Respondent did not answer Q2H although said a canvasser did call (ie Q2H8 equal 9).

Q17A1-Q17A8, Q17B1-Q17B8, Q17C1-Q17C8, Q17D1-Q17D8. There are three reasons for a nought.

- (a) Repondent did not say that leader had the particualr quality
- (b) Respondent did not know which qualities leader did or did not have (ie Q17A9/Q17B9/Q17C9/Q17D9 (as appropriate) equal 8).
- (c) Respondent did not answer question (ie Q17A9/Q17B9/Q17C9/Q17D9 equal 9).
- Q58 There are two reason for a nought
  - (a) Respondent did not receive that benefit
  - (b) Respondent did not answer question (ie Q58N equal 9).
- Q62 There are two reasons for a nought
  - (a) Respondent did not aquire that qualification
  - (b) Respondent did not answer question (ie Q62S equal 9).

### 2 'Non-skipped' open-ended questions

Q3A, Q3B There are three reasons for a blank in the second, third, fourth and fifth reason variables on these questions

- (a) Respondent gave at least one reason in response to question, but did not give a second, third, etc.
- (b) Respondent unable to give a reason (Q3A1/Q3B1 as appropriate) equal 98).
- (c) Respondent did not answer question (Q3A1/Q3B1 equal 99).

### 3 'Skipped' open-ended questions

Q7B, Q8B Nought only means skipped in the case of the first reason variable on these questions. In the case of the second and subsequent reason variables there are four reasons for a nought.

- (a) Q7B/Q8B (as appropriate) skipped (ie Q7A not equal 1 or Q8A not equal 2, 3 or 4).
- (b) Respondent gave at least one reason in response to question, but did not give a second, third, etc.
- (c) Respondent unable to give a reason (Q7B1/Q8B1 equal 98).
- (d) Respondent did not answer question (Q7B1/Q8B1 equal 99).

Q20F Same structure as above. Question skipped if Q20B not equal 1.
