## II INTRODUCTION

This study helps to fill a 7 - year gap between NCDS-3 at age 16 and NCDS-4 at 23

In one way or another, the study attempted to contact 1001 of the NCDS sample Of these, we tried to interview 800 in their homes, and the results of this exercise are described in this documentation as the Feasibility Study (FS)

The interviewer asked respondents, or in some instances other member of the household, if they could leave a self completion questionnaire behind to be filled in by the respondent and returned to the survey organisation—this was sponsored by the Tobacco—Research Council—Results of this exercise are described as the TRC Drop—In addition a further 201 copies of the 'drop' questionnaire posted directly to respondents the results TRC Postal Survey—The TRC Drop and TRC Postal Survey together comprise the TRC

For the details of how the interview study was conducted, interviewer instructions, questionnaire, showcards etc, see sections IV and V

Thus there are 800 respondents for whom we have Feasibility Study and TRC Drop information (or corresponding non-response details) and further 201 for whom we have only TRC Postal Survey (or corresponding non-response)

Items 1 to 692 refer to the Feasibility Study

Items 700 - 799 refer to the TRC Study

Other items on the tape (which relate to NCDS 1-3 data for the most part) should be ignored

If possible, offer advice as to how it should be filled in - show how the codes should be rung at QI for example.
