II INTRODUCTION

This study helps to fill a 7 - year gap between NCDS-3 at age 16 and NCDS-4 at 23

In one way or another, the study attempted to contact 1001 of the NCDS sample. Of these, we tried to interview 800 in their homes, and the results of this exercise are described in this documentation as the Feasibility Study (FS)

The interviewer asked respondents, or in some instances other member of the household, if they could leave a self completion questionnaire behind to be filled in by the respondent and returned to the survey organisation. This was sponsored by the Tobacco Research Council. Results of this exercise are described as the TRC Drop. In addition a further 201 copies of the 'drop' questionnaire posted directly to respondents the results TRC Postal Survey. The TRC Drop and TRC Postal Survey together comprise the TRC

For the details of how the interview study was conducted, interviewer instructions, questionnaire, showcards etc, see sections IV and V

Thus there are 800 respondents for whom we have Feasibility Study and TRC Drop information (or corresponding non-response details) and further 201 for whom we have only TRC Postal Survey (or corresponding non-response)

Items 1 to 692 refer to the Feasibility Study  
Items 700 - 799 refer to the TRC Study

Other items on the tape (which relate to NCDS 1-3 data for the most part) should be ignored

III      CODING FRAME

DATES      Dates are recorded as 2 items, the first referring to the month range 1-12, and the second referring to the year, range 74-80 for non-missing values

For both of these

'Refused'      is coded 88

### BACKGROUND

The National Childrens Bureau have commissioned this survey as the latest stage of their long-term National Child Development Study. We have to find and interview a sample of 800 20 year olds; all of these people have been part of the Study before - and most of them know of the Study and their part in it. Offer a copy of the introductory letter as an explanation for your call.

### WHAT YOU HAVE TO DO

The questionnaires for each respondent you have to interview are in individual envelopes.

Each respondent has:

- a contact questionnaire with name and address filled in on the front page

- a main questionnaire

- a self completion questionnaire for you to leave with the respondent when you have completed the main interview.

You must interview the named person only. The address for the respondent is the best one that we have - 80% have been confirmed within the last few weeks.

Follow sections ABCDE on the contact questionnaire and FOLLOW ALL FILTERS. In most instances you will find the person at the original address and go on to administer a full interview.

In some instances you will find that the respondent does not live at that address. In these cases you should try, at section D, to find out what the respondent's address actually is. Ask neighbours, or at the local post office as necessary. Then follow instructions as to whether you should retain the contact sheet or return it to the office for

## WHAT YOU HAVE TO DO (CONT.)

Payment is by hours and mileage, so do not hesitate to spend some time doing the 'detective work' if necessary.

Any problems with the tracing should be referred to your supervisor or to me; quote the serial number immediately above the letter 'A' as a reference for the respondent.

## SELF-COMPLETION QUESTIONNAIRE

Each respondent has a self-completion questionnaire which is headed 'National Child Development Study - Adult Stage'. This is already filled in with his/her NCB serial number inside the front page. Be sure to leave the right questionnaire with the right respondent.

Make every effort to place this self-completion questionnaire, even if you do not achieve a main interview. For example, if the respondent is away during the survey, leave the questionnaire at his address to be completed when he returns.

When you have completed your main interview, offer the respondent his/her questionnaire together with a FREEPOST ENVELOPE. Thank the respondent very much for his/her help so far and ask him/her to try and find the time to fill this in and post it back. If possible, offer advice as to how it should be filled in - show how the codes should be rung at Q1 for example.

## MAIN QUESTIONNAIRE

FOLLOW ALL FILTERS CAREFULLY; the questionnaire has been designed so that you can work your way smoothly from front to back if you do this.

There are a lot of duplicated sections which you will find yourself skipping in most instances; an average interview length will be 30 minutes.

General: Use the Calendar Card to prompt the respondent for dates throughout the interview.



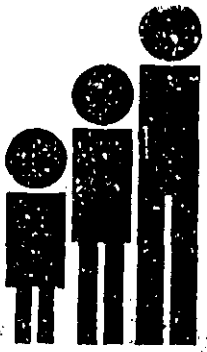
