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


How do you feel when the <u>Conservative Party</u> wins an election? For each row of boxes, please tick one to show how you feel.




How do you feel when the Labour Party wins an election? For each you of boxes, please tick one to show how you feel.




How do you feel when the <u>Social Democratic</u> and Liberal Alliance wins an election?
