

HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD

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COMPUTERIZATION OF A.B. EMDEN'S BIOGRAPHICAL REGISTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD A.D. 1501 TO 1540

Attached is a copy of a memorandum by Mr Fergusson on the computerization of A.B. Emden, A Biographical Register of the University of Oxford A.D. 1501 to 1540 which includes the sixteenth-century scholars in A.B. Emden, A Biographical Register of the University of Oxford to A.D. 1500 and incorporates Ur Emden's unpublished corrections and additions to his volumes. I hope that this makes the scope of the computerization clear, but I shall be happy to enswer any queries about it.

Contributors are invited to write to me specifying any print-out they require. I would like to emphasize that in addition to straightforward print-out of all scholars in a given category (for example all Theologians) it is also perfectly easy to produce lists of scholars who shared two or more features (say all members of New College who studied Civil Law and owned books) or who did not share two or more given features (perhaps members of New College who did not come from the diocese of Winchester).

I should draw attention to one aspect of the computerization. As pointed out in Mr Fergusson's memorandum, each scholar has been included in every "generation", faculty or whatever in which he is recorded. Thus if one needs a print-out which is to be subdivided by generation it is essential to stipulate whether one wants every scholar to be printed under each generation in which he occurs or merely under his first known generation. In print-out of the former kind, that is "by total generation", many scholars will be listed more than once; in print-out of the latter type, that is "by first generation", each scholar will be listed only once. Thus print-out by first generation is best suited to some lines of inquiry and that by total generation to others.

Having decided which scholars are to be selected (all Theologians for example) and how they are to be arranged in the print-out (by first generation or college, by place of origin or whatever) it is necessary to decide what information should be printed against each name. The information contained in any of the "fields" described by Mr Fergusson can be printed, and the fields can be printed in any order; if all or nearly all fields are printed, part of the information



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may appear on a second page on which each name will be repeated.

Requests for print-out should clearly specify:

- 1. The category or categories by which scholars are to be selected.
- 2. The way in which the list is to be arranged (by generation, college and so on).
- 3. The information which is to be printed against each name.

A very sample inquiry might call for all members of St Edmund Hall in a single undivided list with the fields Datecode, Faculty, College and Hall being printed. A more complex request might specify Theologians from the diocese of Durham who were not members of religious orders, arranged by first generation and further subdivided within each generation between the various colleges, and with all fields printed.

It may be that for many purposes it is only the <u>number</u> of scholars in a given category or combination of categories that is required and not a list of names. It is possible to produce such "hit counts" to the same kind of specifications as print-out of names.

I invite you to send me now or in the future requests for print-out which will normally be executed very promptly. All such requests should state in detail precisely what is required. It is generally most convenient to use computer output which is printed on paper, but it is very easy to produce microfiche should this be preferred in any particular case. A wide range of print-out from the computerization of Dr Emden's Biographical Register of Oxford to 1500 is already available for reference in the History's central offices, and it is hoped that similar basic lists from the computerization of the data for 1501-1540 will soon be likewise available.

I shall, of course, be pleased to give you any further information about the computerization and possible print-out should you require it.

COMPUTERIZATION OF THE SIXTEPHTH-CENTURY SCHOLARS IN A.B. D'DEN, A PIOCRAIH-ICAL REGISTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD TO 4 D 1500 AND A BIOGRAPHICAL PRISTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD A D. 1501 TO 1540

Sixtern fields containing coded categories have been prepared for the 7,088* scholars at the University between 1500 and 1540 in Emden's <u>B.R.U.O.</u> to 1500 and <u>B.R.U.O.</u> 1501 to 1540. The sixteen fields are

Datecode, Yeycode, Faculty, GM, College, Hall, SL; Order, Origin, Univ; Book, Officer, Law, Assoc, Ben, Add

D. TECODE

All the scholars have been grouped according to date. The datecodes extend from the middle of the fifteenth century to the end of the sixteenth century, the careers of some sixteenth-century scholars begin as early as the middle of the fifteenth century, while others remained at the University until the end of the sixteenth century. The beriod has been divided into generations of ten years each, running 1500-1509, 1510-1519 and so on. Many scholars' careers overlap two or three 'generations' and some extend into six or even seven. In these cases the scholar has been given more than one datecode. The scholars of absolutely unknown date have been grouped together into a separate category.

Precise dates are not always available, so approximate calculations have had to be made about them from information on offices held, or degrees or licences obtained.

When the first available date in a scholar's life is that of a degree, the following scale of retrospective time allowances has been used

Most of these time allowances are the statutory requirements. Where the statutes do not specify the period of study necessary for a degree, or where the requirements were dispensed with, as in the case of the religious studying Theology, the allowances are based on periods of study offered in a large sample of graces.

* This total comprises the following: 6,129 entries in B.R.U.O. 1501 to 1540 (including 834 entries in Appendix A), 28 new entries from Emden's I'S. addenda and 28 entries listed under main entries as 'to be distinguished from ...' that main entry. The remaining 903 scholars were taken from B.R.U.O. to 1500, and include 6 entries in the Appendix, 7 new entries taken from Emden's IS. addenda and 4 entries listed under main entries as 'to be distinguished from ...' that main entry.

When the first known date is that of an academic position occupied, the following scale has been used

fellow of a college 4 years, except for her College and Freter where 2 years are allowed. These calculations are based on a survey of college statutes available in print, and on deductions from the most reliable secondary sources for colleges whose statutes remain available only in manuscript

scholar ho was a principal of a hall or the instead a school 7 years (he would normally be at least an M.A.).

There no Oxford dates are available, the scholar's 'generation' has been colculated as if he had completed his studies just before taking up his first dated post. If absolutely necessary, the designations magneter and dominus have been used to justify a countback of 7 and 4 years respectively.

Prospective time allowances have been made in the case of scholars licensed to study at Oxford. For instance, a licence granted in 1523 for a period of 4 years places the scholar in both 'renerations' 1520-1529 and 1530-1539, even where there is no other evidence of his presence in Oxford

Absolute precision has been impossible in this field. The general principle adopted has been to make the categories as inclusive as possible, leaving users of them the option of excluding borderline cases.

KFYCODE

This field has been designed for technical purposes at the computer and need not be printed out for contributors.

FACULTY

There are separate categories for the following faculties and groups of faculties:

Theology; Civil Law, Arts and Civil Law; Canon Law; Arts and Canon Law, Both Laws, Arts and Both Laws, Medicine, I'usic

Again with exhaustiveness in mind, both parts of any alternative have been included. A scholar licensed to study Theology or Canon Law has been encoded under both faculties. The Law faculties contain most of these complexities. A scholar is entered in the category for Both Laws if he studied both Laws to any level at Oxford, if he is designated as Legista without further details or if he is only known as having studied 'either Civil or Canon Law'. In the case of Music only those known to have received a degree, and in Medicine to have studied in the faculty, have been included.*

GM

A separate field for those scholars described as Masters of Bachelors of Grammar. Poets Laureate are also included in this field.

COLLEGE

The following secular colleges have been encoded

All Souls, Balliol, Brasenose; Corpus Christi, Cardinal; Christ Church,

* In addition, there is available a list of 4 men (including John Taverner) known to have been musicians but who are not known to have taken a degree in Music.

Exeter, St. John's; Jesus, King Henry VIII, Lincoln; Magdalen, Merton, New College, Oriel, Queen's, Trinity, University

Christ Church, Trinity, Jesus and St. John's were founded after 1540, but some scholars, whose Oxford careers extended beyond 1540, became members of these colleges.

The following monastic colleges have also been encoded

St. Bernard's, Canterbury, Durham; St. Mary's; St. George's College in the Castle, Gloucester

Some of these colleges continued as academic institutions after the Dissolution, for instance Durham, St. Bernard's and Gloucester, and although the Dissolution reduced them to the status of halls, they have been treated here as monastic colleges.

Besides cases of certain membership, a scholar has been coded under a college if he was ordained in the college chapel, entertained in the college or employed by the college. A scholar who rented a room from the college is included, but one who rented a school is not. The Magdalen list includes masters at Magdalen College School.

HALL

Each academic hall has been separately encoded. This does <u>not</u> represent a definitive list of all halls, but only those that appear in Emden. In the encoding an attempt has been made to distinguish different halls with the same name on the basis of ownership or topographical information.

A scholar is entered under a hall if he was a member, a tutor or lector, a principal - single, joint or nominal - the owner, or someone who was engaged in acquiring the hall. If a scholar is a member of a hall that was annexed to or united with another, he is entered under both halls. A hall reduced to the status of a garden is still counted as a hall, as the rules governing the rental were the same.

SL

There is a separate field for scholars who rented schools, either for their own examinations or for lecturing purposes.

ORDER

There are separate codes for each of thirteen religious orders and for unknown religious, friars and monks. Within this field all heads of religious houses and orders are coded in a separate category (this includes provincial heads of orders).

N.B. A scholar is coded under an order even if he joined it after his university career.

ORIGIN

This field includes nine sections covering the geographical origins, family background and pre-university education of scholars.

1) country (other than England). the continental students have been

classified under the modern names of their places of origin. Where no proof of foreign birth exists, scholars have sometimes been listed under the country indicated by their names. Thus 'Maurice Aprice' has been entered as a Welshman.

- 11) diocese this includes all the Figlish and Welsh dioceses of the old foundation, but only those of the new foundation that appear in Emden.
- iii) county. this includes all the English and Welsh counties.
- iv) town, village, parish this category simply indicates that Emden has recorded such information. The place-names themselves have <u>not</u> been encoded except in the case of London.
- y) family relationship (by blood or marriage) this category simply indicates that Emden has recorded such information. The particular relationship has not been encoded.
- v1) <u>father's occupation</u> this category simply indicates that Emden has recorded such information. The particular occupation has <u>not</u> been encoded.
- vii) schooling this category simply indicates that Emden has recorded a scholar's pre-university education. The school attended has not been encoded.
- viii) study outside Oxford a separate category to record any study outside Oxford by a scholar. A fair proportion of the scholars in the Register spent some time at Cambridge. Far fewer studied on the continent. Scholars in this category include all those who, at any stage of their careers, studied, lectured or engaged in administration at Cambridge, any continental university, the Inns of Court or De Vaux College, Salisbury. Incorporation of a degree at Oxford places a scholar in this category.
 - university unknown this category includes those scholars credited with a degree or described as magister or dominus who cannot be assigned with certainty to either Exford or Cambridge. They are exclusively men placed by Emden under an entry as 'to be distinguished from. .' that main entry. They are also coded in category AO in the field ADD.

UNIV

This field contains four categories

- 1) age at admission this category indicates that this is recorded, or clearly implied, by Emden.
- 11) fellow of a college in the case of Cardinal College, King Henry VIII College and Christ Church, the following are encoded as fellows. all those described as prebend or canon of any of the foundations, the six public professors of Cardinal College and the 100 students of Christ Church.
- 111) holy orders this includes all those in priest's, deacon's or minor orders. Also included are all scholars who were college and other chaplains, and all holders of ecclesiastical posts, unless Emden indicates that they were not in orders.
- iv) privileged persons this category includes those listed in the Register who were not scholars, but who came under the jurisdiction of the chancellor's court. By and large, the 'privileged persons' recorded in the Register were either bedels, servants in colleges and halls or those concerned in the production and selling of books.

This field contains three categories

- 1) author a scholar has been listed as an 'author' if he wrote, or had plausibly attributed to him, any literary or scholarly work, even if it has not survived. This category also includes all correspondents, compilators, transcribers and translators, but excludes administrators such as bishops who kept registers of their official acts.
- ii) owner an 'owner' is any scholar who owned, bought, borrowed, stole, was given or who claimed possession of a book, or who, singly or jointly, deposited a book as a pledge in a loan chest, or whose name appears in any part of a book.
- 111) donor a 'donor' is any scholar who gave, lent, sold or bequeathed a book to any person or institution, or who was instrumental in obtaining a book for a person or institution.
- N.B. Scholars who can be classified as both owners and donors are encoded only as donors

OFFICER

This field contains five categories

- 1) office in college or hall other than headship this includes deputy heads, co-principals, bursars, treasurers, deans, chamberlains, college librarians, collectors of college rents, tutors, lectors, college chaplains and conducts, bible clerks.
- 11) principal of a hall
- iii) head of a college this includes anybody described as president, warden, master, rector, and, in the case of the monastic colleges, provisor or prior studentium
- offices includes, for instance, any who was chancellor, vice-chancellor, chancellor's commissary, cancellarius natus, proctor, keeper of a loan chest, bedel, auditor of university accounts, collector of university rents, university chaplain, taxor of lodgings and halls, or any scholar who acted as a legal or diplomatic representative of the university. Signatories of university statutes are also included.
- v) officer in the town this is a category for the small number of scholars who officiated in town matters, either in legal disputes or as members of royal commissions.

LL'I

This field includes four categories to accommodate scholars who followed legal careers, both inside and outside the university

- 1) officers in the chancellor's court apart from the chancellor himself, already coded in the university officer category, all those who officiated in the chancellor's court are included. Litigants, and witnesses to property transactions, are excluded from this category.
- miscellaneous legal officers this category accommodates all scholars who were legal officers. It includes scholars who officiated in any dispute outside Oxford, who held legal posts in either secular or ecclesiastical courts (for example, examiners, proctors and auditors of causes), who were appointed proctors—at—law by colleges or who acted as solicitors.

Jii) notaries public

iv) practice as a lawyer in any court this category includes, for instance, lasters in Chancery, lasters of the Polls, J.P.s., justices of gaol delivery, bishops' and archdeacons' officials, bishops' chancellors and registrars, advocates in consistery and archdeaconal courts, lawyers who practised in the provincial courts, lawyers in the Admiralty Court and any scholar who was a member of the College of Advocates.

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In this field there are seventeen categories covering a wide range of careers that scholars might follow

- 1) royal association (excluding diplomatic service and local government office) in this category are included all scholars the had an association with a king or queen, English or foreign, either by blood or as a member of a royal household, helding offices such as those of king's clerk, chaplain or physician. The category also includes those who received royal gifts or favours, the were attached to St.George's Chapel, Windsor, or who were commissioned to write some work by royal command. Public offices also come under this heading any Chancellor of England, Master of the Rolls, Keeper of the Great Scal or Baron of the Exchequer is included, as well as many less important officers. Keepers of temporalities of bishoprics sede vacante have also been included.
- 11) diplomatic service this list includes all diplomatic and mercantile envoys and ambassadors.

111) local government office

- episcopal association an episcopal associate is defined as any scholar who was employed by a bishop, archbishop or cardinal as chancellor, official, commissary, registiar, vicar general, proctor general, assessor, chaplein, secretary, clork, physician, or any scholar supported at Oxford by a bishop, archbishop or cardinal. Officers in the provincial courts or bishops' consistory courts, witnesses to bishops' charters, executors and legatees of bishops have been included. All associates of Thomas Wolsey, in whatever capacity they served, have also been included. Bishops themselves have been excluded from this category, unless they had previously formed part of another bishop's familia.
- v) noble association this category includes scholars associated by blood with a noble or distinguished family, and all scholars who associated themselves with such a family by personal or political alliance, or who were employed by such a family as chaplain, clerk, legal representative, or who were commissioned by them to write a work. Excluded from this list are employees and associates of Thomas Wolsey or Thomas Crom'ell, unless they were also associated with other nobles.
- vi) associates of Thomas Wolsey this category includes all scholars who were employed by Wolsey in any capacity, or who received particular favours from him. If Emden records that a scholar corresponded with Wolsey on more than one occasion, he is also included.
- vii) associates of Thomas Cromwell this category includes all scholars who were employed by Thomas Cromwell or who received particular favours from him. If Emden records that a scholar corresponded with Cromwell on more than one occasion, he is also included.

vill) record of marriage

- ix) teacher in this category are listed all scholars who at any time taught in a school, or acted as a private tutor. This includes all fellows, masters or other officers of Magdalen School, Eton College, Winchester
 - * i.e. 'lagdalen College 3chool.

- College or Migham Ferrers College. Unless they were masters at Maddalon School, those who acted as tutors in the university are not included in this category.
- x) medical practice—this category includes all scholars who practised medicine or who were members of the Royal College of Physicians. Those who studied medicine at the university are not included unless there is some includent that they subsequently practised medicine.
- x1) bishop this category includes cardinals, archbishops and suffragans.
- yii) dean this category includes only deans of catherrals. Thus the deans of Christ Church are included here as well as in the category 'head of a college', but the deans of Cardinal College and Fing Henry VIII College are excluded.
- xiii) cathedral dignitaries this category includes subdeans, provosts, prebendaries and canons, archdeacons, whether or not they were canons or precendaries, have been included. Canons of Christ Church are included here as well as in the category 'fellow of a college', but the canons of Cardinal College and King Henry VIII College have been excluded.
- xiv) church living this category covers scholars who held any ecclesiastical living (excluding those in categories xi-xiii) and includes, for instance, rectors, vicars, curates, parochial chaplains, chantry priests, members of hospitals, clergy of collegiate churches and those ordained to titles (other than college fellowships), personal chiplains of nobles etc. and those merely licensed to preach or hear confessions in a diocese have been excluded.
- xv) trade this is a category for the small number of scholars who are listed in Enden as having engaged in some form of trade, e.g. brewer, stationer, morcer, shopkeeper.
- xv1) member of parliament i.e. of the Commons.
- xvii) papal officer. this category includes any scholar who was associated with the papacy in any administrative capacity, for instance papal clerks and chaplains to nuncios, envoys and various legal officers such as judges delegate and auditors of causes in the papal palace.

BEN

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This field contains two categories

- 1) benefactors to colleges or halls. this includes scholars who were benefactors to colleges, halls or hostels at either Oxford or Cambridge.
- benefactors to other institutions this includes scholars who were benefactors to other institutions, including the universities, schools, chantries, churches, etc. Benefactions might be in the form of money, lands, books, plate, etc.

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This field has five categories

- 1) scholars listed in the Appendix of <u>B.R.U.O</u> to <u>1500</u> and Appendix A of <u>B.R.U.O.1501</u>,—1540 who may have been at Oxford or Cambridge but who were probably at Oxford.
- 11) entries included by Emden with serious reservations.
- 111) manuscript addenda this identifies either entirely new entries or

entiles incorporating new material, from Emden's MS. addenda.

- a category for the scholars listed in <u>P.R.U.O.</u> to 1500 whose careers at Oxford extended beyond 1500. The list was obtained from the computerized index to <u>P.P.U.O.</u> to 1500.
- v) a category for men listed by Endea under an entry as 'to be distinguished from ...' that main entry. Only those known to have been at O (ford or Cambridge, nil those credited with a degree of described as magister or deminus who cannot be assigned with certainty to either Oxford or Cambridge have been included. There their names differ from the scholar in the main entry, the name of the latter is given in brackets.

Further to my memorandum of 23 May 1974 circulated with Miss Mullally's introduction to the History's computerized index to A.B. Emden, A Biographical Register of the University of Oxford to A.D. 1500 and to Miss Mullally's "File of Lists Retrieved from the Computerized BRUO Index" of 26 September 1974, I now attach a hendlist which contains a new key to the symbols used in the index and and updated list of files retrieved from the index which totally supersedes Miss Mullally's list of 26 September 1974. (Please note that the terms "file" and "category" are now used in different and more exact senses than in the earlier documents.)

I should emphasize that in addition to the correction of minor errors of data-processing one major error has been rectified: in the original data-processing Austin Canons and Austin Friars were aggregated under "Augustinians" (computer code OA), and these have now been separated into the distinct categories "Austin Canons" (code AC) and "Austin Friars" (code OA). This means that any file previously retrieved from the index in which the field "Order" is printed out is incorrect, and contributors who have such files should apply for new print-out.

As I stated in my memorandum of 23 May 1974, and as repeated in the attached handlist, I will be pleased to receive from contributors requests for print-out from the index, whether or not suitable files already exist. Please do not hesitate to get in touch with me further about using the index. Address all inquiries to me at Corpus Christi College.

KEY TO SYMBOLS USED IN THE INDEX AND LIST OF FILES RETRIEVED FROM THE INDEX

There follows a list of "files" (this and other terms are explained below in the Introductory Notes) which have been retrieved from the History's computerized index to the three volumes of Dr. A.B. Eman's <u>Biographical Register of the University of Oxford to A.D. 1500</u>. The careers of some of the alumni listed in these three volumes extended beyond the year 1500, and they have been classified accordingly in the index. However, the index does not yet cover Dr. Emden's further volume <u>A Biographical Register of the University of Oxford A.D. 1501 to 1540</u>. Thus any section of a file retrieved from the index entitled <u>after 1500</u> relates only to alumni recorded in the first three volumes (to A.D. 1500).

COPIES OF THE FILES LISTED BELOW ARE AVAILABLE FOR REFERENCE IN THE HISTORY'S CENTRAL OFFICES IN THE CLARENDON BUILDING, BROAD STREET. Contributors can readily be provided with duplicate copies of these files (whether of complete files or of specified portions of files) on request to the Director of Research; the name and subject of each file required, as given in this handlast, should be cited in each request.

IN ADDITION IT IS POSSIBLE TO CREATE NEW FILES TO THE SPECIFICATIONS OF INDIVIDUAL CONTRIBUTORS (subject to the availability of suitably trained research assistants on the staff of the History). Contributors are strongly advised to give very careful consideration to the precise formulation of their requests; generally it is best to detail at the outset <u>all</u> the information which <u>might</u> be of use.

FILES CAN BE CREATED by selecting any of the categories detailed in the attached Key to Fields and Symbols (each two-character symbol represents a category); it is also possible to base files on the combination and/or the non-combination of different categories (for example it would be possible to create a file listing theologians who studied outside Oxford but were not members of Colleges). Regardless of the category or categories used to define the enquiry that creates a file, any number of the fields detailed in the attached Key may be printed out in the file (see Note 2 below).

Introductory Notes

- 1. The computer FILE is the basic unit in which information retrieved from the computerized index is arranged and stored. Files are stored on magnetic tape and can be printed out on to the standard computer lineprinter paper, in whole or in part, as often as required. The name of the file appears near the head of every print-out after the word "document".
- 2. The attached Key gives the names of the various <u>FIELDS</u> in the index, the the <u>categories</u> of information contained in each field, and the symbols by which these categories have been encoded. (For example the field named "Order" contains twelve categories, each of which has a unique two-latter symbol, eleven of these represent membership of particular religious orders and the twelfth headship of a religious house.)

- 3. <u>HITS</u> are the number of records (that is scholars) falling within the bounds of each enquiry. Hit-counts are printed at the beginning of each file; the hit-count gives a total for the whole enquiry and, where applicable, subtotals for the various parts of the enquiry (where the enquiry is divided between generations or colleges for example). Due to the fact that many scholars fall into more than one category within the same field (two or more faculties, colleges etc.) the sum of the sub-totals is often greater than the overall total.
- 4. In this handlist the phrase <u>SINGLE LIST</u> signifies that the information in question is arranged in one undivided list, each name appearing only once in that list. Lists are essentially alphabetical, but with names from the various appendices and addenda to <u>BRUO</u> placed at the end of each list.
- 5. Files are often subdivided into "generations". These generations are essentially the twenty-year generations detailed in the key to the field "Datecode". However, the period between 1500 and 1559 as covered in the first three volumes of BRUO is generally given as a single generation after 1500. Similarly the first generation in a file will not necessarily cover an exact twenty-year period but depending on the subject of the file may be, for instance, before 1200, before 1300, before 1460 etc.
- 6. Lists designated <u>BY GENERATION</u> are subdivided into these chronological "generations". Every scholar will be listed in <u>each</u> of the generations during which he was resident in the <u>University</u>; the sum of the hit-counts for all of the generations will therefore be significantly greater than the total hit-count for the overall enquiry. Files arranged by total generation in this way are necessary to give a full profile of each particular generation. However, it is difficult or impossible to make accurate overall calculations from such files in view of the large element of duplication between generations.
- 7. In some situations it is therefore useful to have files arranged BY FIRST GENERATION. These files are also arranged by generation, but each scholar is listed under only one generation: his first generation if he is recorded under more than one, or his only generation if he is recorded under one generation only. These lists therefore give a different type of generational profile, which is of interest in itself, and also have the advantage for some purposes that each scholar is listed only once. By the same token it would be possible to create files BY SECOND GENERATION or only generation.
- 8. If a generation contains no scholars satisfying the conditions of the enquiry then the various headings relating to this generation will normally be suppressed. This can be checked against the hit-count at the beginning of the file, where the total for any generation not printed out should be given as zero.
- 9. If a file contains scholars of <u>UNKNO'IN DATE</u> these will be listed as a separate generation. The total number of scholars of unknown date in a file can usually be found in the hit-count (even when the total is zero) after "ENOO".
