

## CCC DATABASE STRUCTURE

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20 March 81

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1. This document describes an IDMS system to support analysis of the data already collected by the History of the University team for analysis by FIND. The data concerns the careers of members of Corpus Christi College, but the system here defined is sufficiently flexible to allow incorporation of similar data from other sources at a later stage, if so desired.
  2. In an IDMS database information is held as objects of differing types and names called RECORDS. Groups of records are associated (by system-generated pointers) into larger objects called SETS, which can then be processed with high efficiency by user-written programs or by an interactive query processor. This method greatly reduces data redundancy, as there is no need to store the object representing one piece of information more than once, and many types of processing are highly optimised.

All of the records and sets used in an IDMS application must be defined once for all in a description which is called the database SCHEMA. The remainder of this document consists of an informal schema description for discussion purposes. It contains a schema diagram which represents the structure of the proposed database in terms of records and sets and secondly a record description which gives the names, significance and lengths of all the records to be held in the database. In addition, the identifying numbers of the fields in the FIND data description corresponding to the IDMS record items have been given, where possible, and a proposed codebook included.

It should be emphasised that alterations in the basic structure of an IDMS system cannot easily be made once the data has been loaded. For this reason it is important to make the schema description adequate for all applications envisaged. Subsets of the structure can be provided (subschemas) appropriate to particular purposes, in which data item names, lengths or types may be changed, but new sets or keys cannot be added without re-processing all of the input data.

3. In the schema diagram the boxes represent types of record and the arrows linking them represent types of set. Each record-type has a name (e.g. SCHOLAR) and a 'location mode' which is either CALC or VIA. The latter defines how occurrences of the record type are to be physically distributed throughout the storage area defined for the database. CALC means that occurrences are scattered at random throughout the area, and that they may be directly accessed by supplying a value for the data-item which is defined as the 'calc key' for the record. Thus immediate access to the record describing any particular scholar may be obtained simply by supplying his name - there is no need (as there is with FIND) to search through the file rejecting all the others beforehand.

Occurrences of records with location mode VIA are clustered together in such a way that, for example, all the EVENT records associated with one scholar by an occurrence of the SCH-EVENT set (see below) are as physically close to that scholar's SCHOLAR record as possible. This has obvious benefits in terms of system performance.

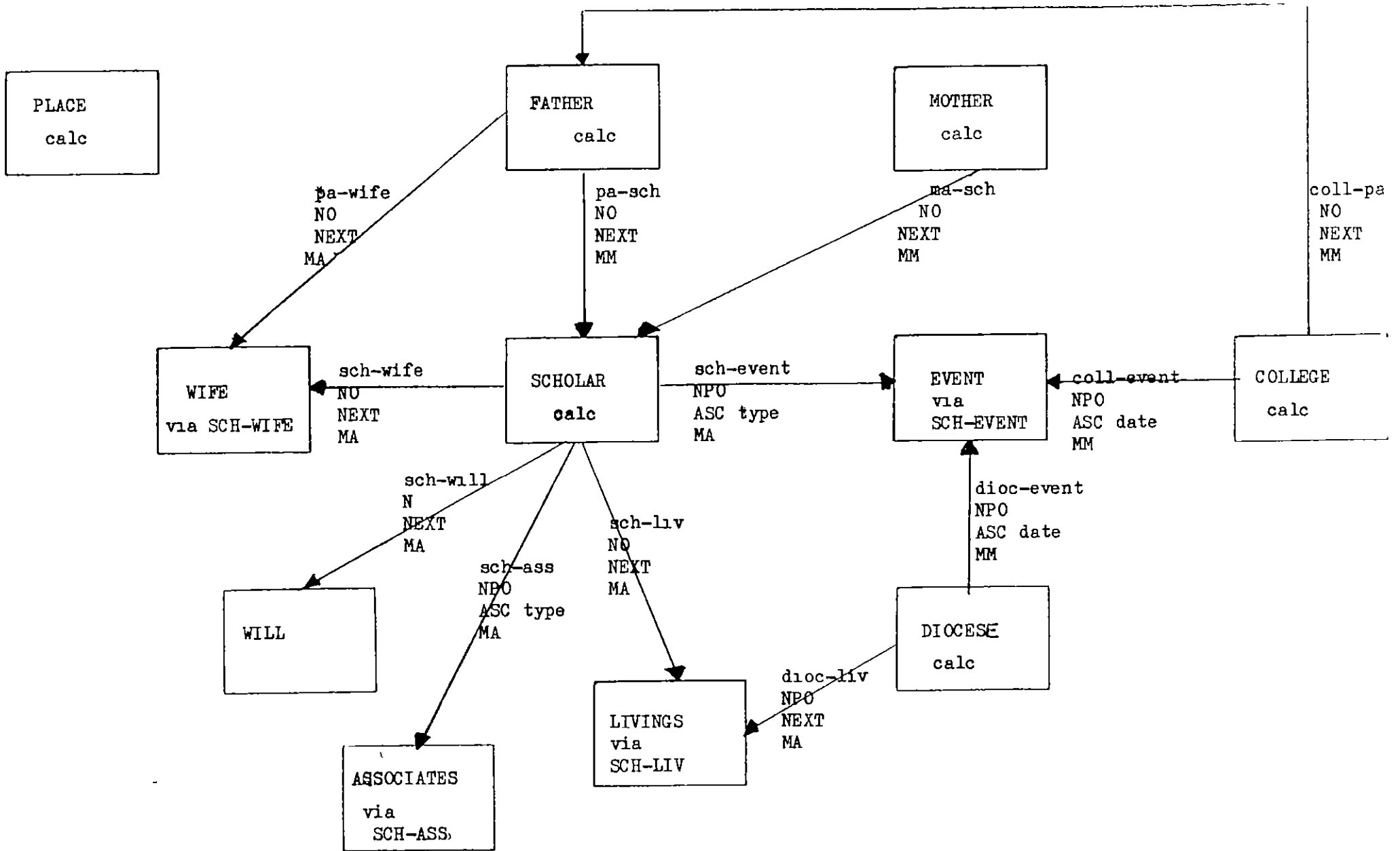
No further details of the records are included in the schema diagram. It should be clearly understood that all occurrences of a particular record type have exactly the same layout (as described by the Record Description). Thus when a scholar has more than one wife, rather than allow for repetitions of the wife data within a single record, several wife records will be stored, all of which are associated with the same scholar record. Such an association is called a set

A set may be thought of as a group of linked records of at least two different types. Each set occurrence consists of exactly one record occurrence of one type (the OWNER - e.g. scholar) and one or more occurrences of one or more other types (the MEMBERS - e.g. wife). The schema diagram represents all the sets which may exist by means of an arrow, going from owner record type to member record type. There is no limit on the number of sets in which a record type may participate, as owner or member, but of course each involves some overhead.

Three items of information are included for each set in addition to its name.

(a) the number and type of pointers available (b) the order of the set and (c) the transience and optionality of set membership. It is not of course necessary to understand all the implications of the attached proposed structure, but the following details may be helpful.

- (a) A set is implemented by means of <sup>a chain of</sup> 4-byte pointers held in the record occurrences. Up to three such pointers may be supplied: NEXT, which points from the owner record to the first member record, from there to the second member, and so on to the last, the NEXT pointer of which points back to the owner. PRIOR pointers run in the opposite direction - from the owner to the last member, then the next-to-last and so on back to the owner again. OWNER pointers point directly to the owner record from each member record. Thus for large sets it is usually advisable to have all three, as operations such as finding the owner of a set or inserting or deleting a new member can be very expensive without OWNER or PRIOR pointers respectively. On the other hand, for very small sets (such as SCH-WILL which is unlikely ever to have more than one member) there is no need to include all three.
- (b) The order of a set defines the order in which member records are accessed, and thus where new members are to be added relative to existing members. It may be FIRST or LAST, ASC or DESC, NEXT or PRIOR. The first implies that new members are always inserted either at the head (FIRST) or the tail (LAST) of the chain of pointers, i.e. adjacent to the owner. The second implies that the insertion point is determined by the value of a data item defined within the member record type. Whilst expensive for very large or volatile sets, this facility can be useful when access to set members in some specific order is a common requirement. Since ordering is done by pointers rather than by physically re-positioning the members, it is perfectly possible for record types which are members of more than one set to be 'sorted' in more than one way at once. Thus EVENTS can be extracted in date-order within College, or in type-order within Scholar. The last option is a 'don't-care' option, implying that new records are inserted next or prior to the current occurrence of the member record type.
- (c) Finally, membership in a set may be permanent ('Mandatory') or transient ('Optional'), and obligatory ('Automatic') or optional ('Manual'). For this application, the only relevant combinations are MA (mandatory automatic) and MM (mandatory manual) since the data is somewhat static. MA implies that a member record occurrence cannot exist without being connected to some owner record in the set, while MM implies that not all member record occurrences need be connected to an owner in this particular set. Thus a WIFE cannot be recorded at all without being connected to both a FATHER and a SCHOLAR, while an EVENT may exist without necessarily being connected to both a COLLEGE and a DIOCESES, or indeed either. Similarly a SCHOLAR may be stored, even without MOTHER or FATHER.

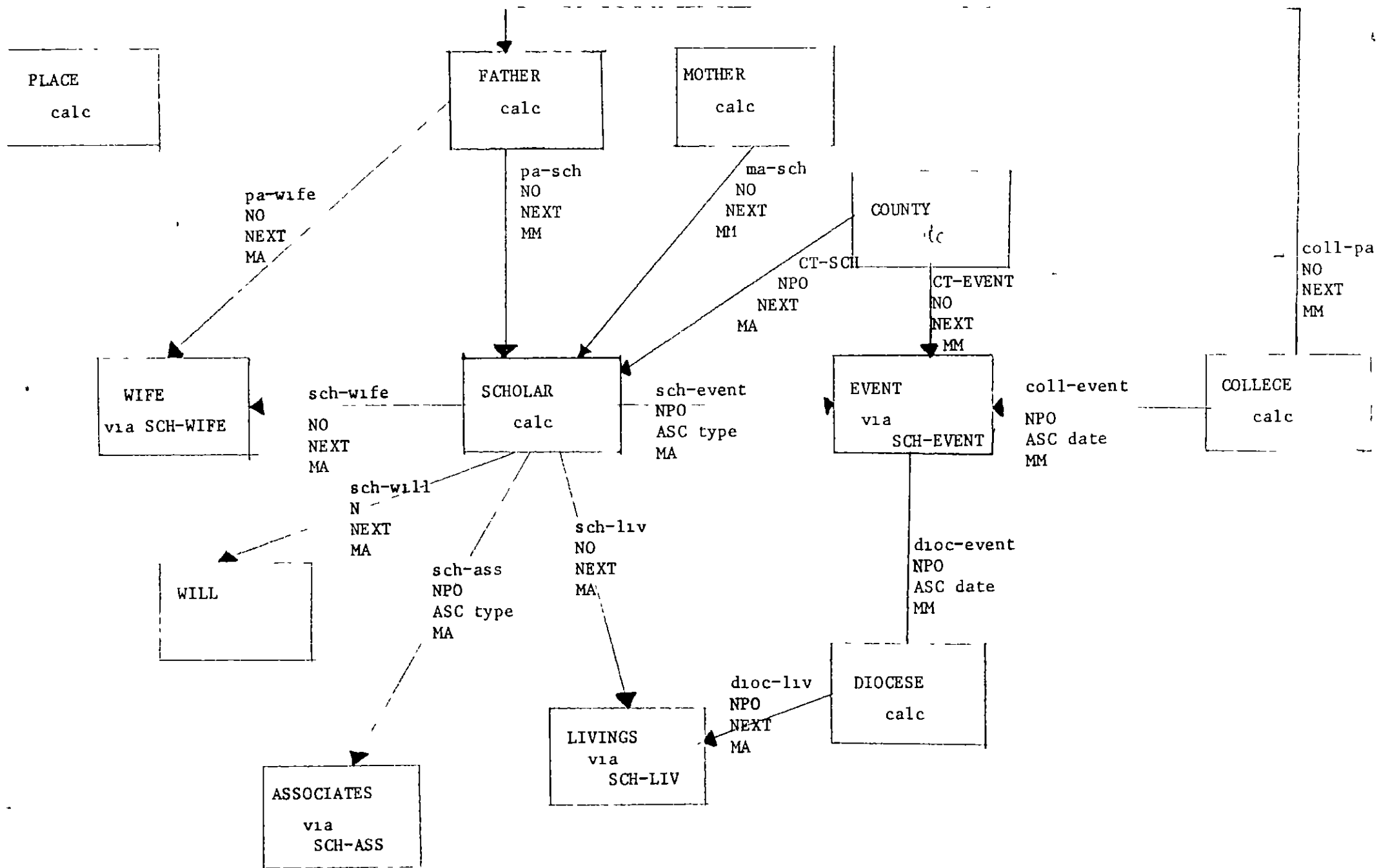

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mathematics, poetry, music and literature. The number who studied elsewhere is surprisingly small, only seventeen are known to have incorporated at Cambridge, and despite the violent religious changes, the number who went abroad for studies at some stage of their career is only twenty-six. It confirms both the nature of the college and the temper of the times that the best-known graduates of the day were great divines: John Jewel, John Rainolds and Richard Hooker.

*A note on the collective biography of Corpus Christi College*

A background study to the foregoing from the records of four sixteenth-century foundations (Corpus Christi, Christ Church, Trinity and St John's colleges) was published in *The University in Society* 1 (see p. 666 n. 1 above). A questionnaire directing the collection of much more detailed information about the members of Corpus Christi College was drawn up somewhat earlier by me, and the initial work on the Tudor population of Corpus was done by Barbara Austin working from the college archives, chiefly in the *Liber admissionum*, which recorded admissions to the places of *discipuli* and *scholares* (probationer fellows), most choristers, chaplains and servants, the *Libri magni* (treasurers' accounts), the fellows' bonds, and the *Visus*, a set of accounts for the period 1537-42. These lists were compared with the original registers of congregation, where 107 men were discovered who had matriculated or taken degrees from Corpus but whose names were not recorded on the foundation. At the next stage, Kenneth G. Powell searched the available printed sources with special attention to ecclesiastical records, the registered wills of the prerogative court of Canterbury, local testamentary records, the registers of the inns of court and heraldic materials printed by the Harleian Society. He also searched the registers of bishops Bonner, Ridley, Thirlby and Grindal and the card index of ordinations in the Guildhall Library, as well as appropriate episcopal registers at Lambeth Palace. Through the courtesy of York Herald, Dr C. M. J. F. Swan, the manuscript sources at the College of Arms were made available. The History of Parliament Trust also very kindly gave access to the information in their unpublished files. The State Papers and, in the British Museum, manuscripts in the Royal and Harleian collections and among the Additional MSS were searched. Outside London the repositories chiefly consulted were, in Oxford (in addition to Corpus Christi College) the university archives and the Bodleian Library, the county record offices at Bristol, Durham, Chelmsford (Essex), Exeter, Kingston (Surrey), Lincoln, Maidstone (Kent), Preston and Lancaster, Taunton (Somerset) and Winchester, and the City Library and diocesan archives at Gloucester and York.

These files were then reviewed, controlled and enlarged by Dr C. S. Knighton who undertook further research at Corpus and Lambeth, and in the diocesan archives of Ely, Winchester, Lincoln, Exeter, Salisbury and Canterbury. He is chiefly responsible for the final version of the biographical files now in the offices of the History of the University in typescript, although all points of difficulty were settled by a joint decision. Dr Knighton and I together encoded the data in these files for easier access according to the computer program

FIND2 I am indebted to him and to Dr G D Duncan for their assistance in proof-reading these encoded files, which were intended to play the role of an index to the full biographical collections. The ICL 1906A computer for which this was prepared unfortunately was taken out of service shortly after the computerized index was completed, and the FIND2 program was inappropriate for the ICL 2988 computer which replaced it. The original program was abandoned in March 1981. A revised data model on the Data Base Management System IDMS was designed by Mr Lou Bernard of the Oxford Computing Service by April 1982 and became operable in September 1983. I wish to thank Mr Paul Salotti for his assistance in implementing the new program.

#### THE TEACHING OF ARTS IN COLLEGES

The great majority of undergraduates entered none of the higher faculties, reading rather some part or all of the programme in arts. What did they learn? We have shown that the evolution of undergraduate teaching in the colleges was a prominent feature of the university's life from the fifteenth century on, being developed in the first place for men on the foundation. These were expected to follow the statutory curriculum in arts beginning with the elements of logic, although college statutes might add their own requirements, as did Corpus by introducing instruction in Greek.<sup>1</sup> The college lectures were essential in this teaching, accompanied of course by exercises in disputation and, as the influence of humanism spread, by the art of declamation. Equally important was the tutor, about whom something more must now be said.

The principal duty of the tutor was to act as a surety for the junior members of the college to see that they paid their debts (including those owing to the college) and that they conducted themselves responsibly. Waynflete's 'creansers' were a model for the future of this institution.<sup>2</sup> Supervision of his pupils' studies was a natural part of the tutor's office, and with the advent of the printed book to facilitate it, his general responsibility developed naturally into some teaching done directly by himself. In the statutes given to Clare College, Cambridge in 1549 the commissioners of Edward VI insisted among other things that tutors be assiduous in 'teaching
