INSTRUCTIONS TO CODERS ON USE OF SUBJECT CODING FRAME

- A The coding frame is set out in the following way:-
 - (i) Major headings for each subject area are boxed.
 These are listed in the following order:
 - P.1 Education, Medicine, Dentistry & Ancillary Health subjects, Engineering
 - P.2 Technology, Agriculture, Forestry and Veterinary Science
 - P.3 Science, Social Administrative and Business Subjects
 - P.4 Miscellaneous Professional and Vocational Subjects, Languages, Arts, other than Languages
 - P.5 Music, Drama & Visual Arts.
 - (ii) Subjects are listed in alphabetical order under these major headings
 - (iii) Within each major grouping there are some subjects which consist of a combination of subjects e.g. hairdressing/cosmetics/beauty and these are known as within-group combination. There are no within-group combinations under the Education heading.

In most instances coding for subjects will be easy - use the major headings to help you locate the given subject.

There will be a number of cases where a course will be for a qualification or qualifications which are not therefore single subject categories qualification. The subject coding frame is designed to cope with these cases, and the following explanation should help you to deal with them.

B Rules for coding combination of subjects

If a subject recorded on the questionnaire appears to encompass two or more subjects on the coding frame then it should be treated in one of three ways:

- (i) If it includes both a major and subsidiary activity e.g. "bricklaying (also did some pottery)", code for main subject only, in this case: 161
- (ii) If all subjects fall within one major heading e.g. "Biology & Chemistry", code as within-group combination (in this case 410)
- (iii) If subjects come from more than one major head, e.g. "Psychology & Biology", use the combination category relating to the subject with the lowest code number (that is, the combination category from the relevant main head which comes first in the list). In the example, Science (which includes Biology) precedes Social, Admin, Business (which includes Psychology), therefore, this combination is coded 411, combinations of Science with other subjects.
- C Coding CSE's 'O' and 'A' levels (and City & Guilds or ONC's where there are several subjects)
 - (i) If 'A's or ONC/ONDs, City & Guilds are entered on the questionnaire in combination with 'O's or CSEs (i.e. 'O's or CSEs are

taken as part of the same course): ignore '0's/CSEs.

- (ii) Code 'A' levels to the subject code or appropriate combination category.
- (iii) If the course is for '0' levels and/or CSEs only:
 - If there is only one (e.g. Maths '0' level) code to the appropriate subject code (380 in this case)
 - If there is more than one, always code as 708 this category is to be used only for these cases.

D Professional Qualification

If the qualification is not an '0' or 'A' level and it is hard to code, check the professional qualifications list, (even if the qualification code is not a 24). Bear in mind that the list is in strict alphabetical order, so that, for example, "institutions" come after "institutes". If it turns out that the course is for a professional qualification, even though it has not been coded as such, you should recode it to the appropriate level (see codebook).

CODING FRAME AND OPEN CODED ANSWERS TO LITERACY AND NUMERACY QUESTIONS (Q29, Q8; P29, Q11; P30, Q13)

The proposed coding frames below are based on a minimum of 100 responses requiring coding. Amongst these questionnaires there were <u>no</u> responses which required multi-coding. In the event that responses are found for which two or more codes apply, these will be dealt with either by coding as 'other' or by extending the codes to include combinations where needed. Given that no such need arose in more than 100 responses, it is most unlikely that this will lead to any problems in coding the remaining questionnaires that might affect the use of the coded variables.

1. Respondents who said that problems with reading, writing or spelling caused difficulties in everyday life were asked 'What things in particular cause difficulties?'.

Overwhelmingly, respondents gave answers which described aspects of their lives which were affected by their lack of skill rather than the specific tasks which they found difficult. The exception to this was the large number of responses in which problems with forms and/or letters were mentioned. This information is worthy of coding because of the many situations in which the ability to deal with these things are at a premium, for example, in applying for jobs or benefit

A number of responses indicated very limited literacy skills indeed (typically 'I can't read or write'), this information too, will be coded, to identify what can only be described as a very disadvantaged group of people.

The proposed coding is as follows:

a. Context in which difficulties occur

- 1 = at work
- 2 = applying for/looking for/interviews for jobs
- 3 = at home children
- 4 = at home household management, shopping etc.
- 5 = other context
- 6 = no particular context mentioned.
- b. Problems with letters or forms
- 1 = letters and forms cause problems
- 2 = letters cause problems
- 3 = forms cause problems
- 4 = neither mentioned.
- c. severely limited literacy skills

These will be coded according to the International Classification of Disease: (I.C.D.) which is produced by the World Health Organization. The minth revision of the Classification will be used.

The I.C.D. is extensively used in health studies. Although originally formulated last century to categorise causes of death, its scope has successively been broadened for use in studies of general morbidity. The General Household Survey, for example, uses the most detailed version of I.C.D. to code all conditions ranging from langstanding illness, disability or handicap to reasons for consulting a G.P. An internationally accepted standard with such a wide range of application seemed the obvious choice for a longitudinal study such as NCDS. As a scheme that covers all age groups it will be suitable for use in any projected follow up of the survey members Furthermore, it not only allows the identification of conditions currently of interest but also introduces some element of foresight in coding conditio which may become of relevance to the future health of the 23 year olds.

The I.C.D. is primarily a coding frame based on 3 digits from 1 to 999. Mos of these categories can be further subdivided but it was felt that it is neither desirable nor practicable to use such subdivisions for NCDS 4.

Non-specificity of condition is taken into account in the scheme by assignir special codes according to location or in some cases circumstances. Use of the 3 digit codes enables us to identify individuals with selected conditions. It also provides flexibility in the choice and range of regroup to be used in the analysis. These can be produced at the processing stage without a further coding operation from the questionnaire being necessary. Perusal of a sample of questionnaires indicated that the information collected in NCDS 4 is suitable for coding according to the 3 digit I.C.D. It should be noted that many of the available categories will be unused. T is to be expected with such a comprehensive coding frame and does not affect the arguments for using it.

The WHO has produced an alphabetical index for assigning conditions to I.C.I It includes alternative expressions, some of them non-medical, for condition where they exist. To make the coding task easier we have produced a much shorter index containing some of the more commonly reported conditions and some of the non medical expressions that do not appear in the WHO. This index is intended for the coding of handicapping conditions, hospital admissions, conditions resuiring medical supervision and other medical conditions. A preliminary version of the index, which is likely to be subject to some additions/amendments, is attached. Respondents were asked about up to seven hospital admissions and up to 4 conditions requiring regular medical supervision. The questionson longstanding illness, disability or handicap were open-ended as were the questions about permanen disability resulting from accidents and about other medical conditions.

- 1. Each code has either 3 or 4 digits. Usually the fourth digit when there is one indicates a further classification within the main category. For example, codes (N) 880 (N) 887 cover laceration of open wounds of upper limb, and to each of these categories a fourth digit is added as follows:-
 - .0 Without mention of complication
 - .1 Complicated
 - .2 With tendon involvement
 - .9 Late effect

This frame is based on the first three digits.

- 2. (i) The abbreviation N.O.S. = Not otherwise specified
 - (11) The abbreviation N.E.C. = Not elsewhere classifiable.

A composite list of commonly reported conditions, terms not in the Index, and conditions which present some difficulty in coding has been drawn up. It should be noted that this list is always used in conjunction with the I.C.D. as coding from the list alone could lead to error.

3. Alphabetical codes are not used. These are substituted here for 3 digit codes not used by I.C.D. - see back page of coding guide.

The I.C.D. is grouped into 17 broad subcategories. They are listed here, along with their 3 digit codes and examples of conditions that are likely to be reported in NCDS.

- 1. Infections and Parasitic Diseases (001-139), Tuberculosis (11), Shingles (53), Herpes Simplex (54), Glandular Fever (75).
- Neoplasms (140-239)
 This group is subdivided according to malignancy and site.

- 6. Diseases of the Nervous System and Sense Organs (330-389) Nervous System (320-359), Epilepsy (345), Migraine (346), Eye (360-379),
 Detached retina (361), Blindness (369), Ear and Mastoid Process (380-389),
 Ear infection (382), Deafness (389).
- 7. Diseases of the Circulatory System (390-459), Heart Disease (429), Haemorrhoids (455)
- 8. Diseases of the Respiratory System (460-519), Tonsillitis (463), Hay Fever (477), Bronchitis (490), Asthma (493)
- 9. Diseases of the Digestive System (520-579), Duodenal Ulcer (532), Appendicitis (541), Cirrosis of Liver (571).

I.C.D: DISEASE CODING! _ Notes for Coders on use of ICD Vols I and II

Diseases are coded from the "International Classification of Diseases" (World Health Organisation). Where a condition can be identified, any symptoms of that same condition are ignored; for example aching limbs are not coded for a person who has flu. Where a condition cannot be identified, symptoms are coded. This frame uses the 3 digit codes only.

Coders are instructed to read through the Introduction in the I.C.D. before starting to code diseases.

The index is used in the following way:

First, the condition is looked up in the alphabetical index in Volume II. The number given after the description is then checked in Volume I to ensure that the category is sensible when it is applied to the specific condition described in the schedule. Also, a check may be made against the sex of the informant where this may have some bearing on the codes used (e.g. in the cate of infertility sex is taken into account).

In most cases the description given in the schedule will be in everyday language rather than medical terms, and Volume II of the index does include non-medical terms. The amount of detail given by informants varies, and sometimes the recorded answer includes both a disability and also the cause of the disability. Where this occurs the <u>cause</u> only is coded, but if the disability resulting from the cause developed at a later stage and there is a late effect code to cover the disease, this code is used. In some cases there is a completely separate 3 digit code for late effect; for example late effect of Polio. A rough guide to indicate at which point the late effect ode should be applied is to count as late effect anything which developed from a cause a year or more after the original illness or disability was experienced. There are exceptions to this however; for example, a fracture which will not heal is coded as late effect of fracture irrespective of when the fracture occurred. If the cause is not given, the disability is coded.

In the case of surgery or operations, the condition or complaint leading to surgery is coded unless it is not specified in which case the code 898 is, used.

A classification of diseases is a system of categories to which disease entities are assigned according to a set of established criteria. The International Classification of Diseases (ICD) is a statistical classificatory disease coding system devised by the World Health Organisation (WHO) to serve a variety of purposes — vital statistics offices (OPCS), sickness surveys (including the General Household Survey), medical services etc. It was devised to provide a common basis of classification for general statistical use. It is periodically reviewed and amended by the WHO at the International Conference for the Revision of the International Classification of Diseases. The ICD is a widely used system and its use facilitates comparisons of data from different sources — independent surveys, vital statistics and the General Household Survey (OPCS) etc.
