DOCUMENTATION OF THE BLAISE QUESTIONNAIRE *FINAL*

Notes:

1. This is an edited documentation of the Blaise program. Not all variables that appear here are on the SPSS file. (Those that are not are marked with a '\$'). Similarly, not all derived variables that are on the SPSS file are mentioned here. See also separate documentation of derived variables.
2. Unless otherwise specified, 'Don't Know' is code 8 for single column questions, code 98 for two column questions, and so on.
3. Unless otherwise specified, 'Refusal/Not answered' is code 9 for single column questions, code 99 for two column questions, and so on. Where there is an explicit 'Refusal' code (usually code 7 or 97), then code 9 (or 99 and so on) is reserved for 'Not answered' only.
4. Sections in brackets and italics were textfilled as appropriate on the interviewers' computers.
5. Routing instructions appear above the questions. A routing instruction should be considered to stay in force until the next routing instruction.
6. '(NOT ON SCREEN)' means that the question did not appear on the interviewers' or editors' screens. '(EDIT ONLY)' means it appeared on screen for the editors but not the interviewers. Individual codes marked 'EDIT ONLY' were used by the editors to reclassify 'other' answers.
7. For some questions respondents could give an answer other than one of those listed in the codeframe (these are generally indicated in code frame by the instruction: (WRITE IN). Such answers were recorded verbatim and examined during the editing process to see whether any could be 'back-coded' to one of the existing answer categories. These are not available on the SPSS file and have not been detailed within this documentation.

2005 Scottish Social Attitudes Survey

NOTE FOR USERS (January 2007)

This note provides information in brief about the survey. It accompanies the final version of the main datafile (ssa05.por).

About the survey

The SSA survey was conducted by the Scottish Centre for Social Research¹. The modules covered attitudes towards national identity, fertility, the health service, providing for old age, social identities and public services in Scotland.

The survey was designed to yield a representative sample of the population in Scotland aged 18+, including those living north of the Great Glen / Caledonian Canal. The sample of addresses was drawn from the Postcode Address File and was boosted to increase the number of addresses selected from remote and rural parts of Scotland. At each address, the interviewer established how many occupied dwelling units it contained. If there were several, one was selected at random for interview (using a Kish grid and random numbers). The interviewer then established how many adults aged 18+ lived in the (selected) dwelling unit. If there were several, one adult was selected (using a similar procedure as that used for dwelling units). The unequal selection probabilities arising from these procedures are taken into account by the weighting. The whole sample is representative of the Scottish population, additional weights on the data file need to be used to analyse the rural boost separately.

The fieldwork was conducted by NatCen. Interviews were conducted in the respondent's home, using a laptop computer. In 2005, the face-to-face interview lasted an average of 57 minutes and were then followed by a self-completion questionnaire.

Fieldwork was carried out between August and December 2005. A summary of the response is as follows:

Weighting

The main dataset (in common with all surveys based on samples from the Postcode Address File) must be weighted to take account of differing selection probabilities. Simplifying slightly: households are selected with equal probability, but only one person in each household is interviewed. People in small households therefore have a higher probability of selection than people in large households and the weighting corrects for this. In addition addresses in remote and rural parts of Scotland had a greater chance of selection due to the rural boost, the main sample weight [WtFactor] also corrects for this.

Please note that the data must be weighted in all analysis. The file is **not** preweighted. Before running any analysis, please use the following SPSS command:

weight by wtfactor.

(or similar, depending on the exact syntax of your version of SPSS).

Analysis using the rural/ urban variable 'SHSRural' and summaries derived from it:

To over-sample in rural areas, the 6-fold Scottish Executive Urban Rural Classification was used. This was previously called the Scottish Household Survey Urban Rural Classification. Areas are classified as shown below:

	Area type	Postcode units in
1	'Large urban' (previously 'four cities')	Settlements over 125,000 population (Aberdeen, Dundee, Glasgow and Edinburgh)
2	Other 'Urban'	Other settlements over 10,000 population
3	'Small, accessible towns'	Settlements 3-10,000 population and within a 30 minute drive time of a settlement of 10,000 or more
4	'Small, remote towns'	Settlements 3-10,000 population and more than a 30 minute drive time of a settlement of 10,000 or more
5	'Accessible rural'	Settlements less than 3,000 population and within a 30 minute drive time of a settlement of 10,000 or more
6	'Remote rural'	Settlements less than 3,000 population and more than a 30 minute drive time of a settlement of 10,000 or more

Since fewer people live in remote areas than in accessible rural areas, the survey boosted the number of respondents in some areas within the classification more than others. This means that people in different types of rural areas had different chances of selection, and thus it has been necessary to create additional weights for certain analyses of the rural boost of the sample.

Analysis using the variable SHSRural

If using the 6-fold urban/ rural variable the standard WTFACOR weighting variable should be used.

Analysis using collapsed versions of the variable SHSRural

For some analyses the Scottish Executive urban rural definition is collapsed. The following 2-fold categorisations can be used (spss variable name in brackets):

- Ministerial Urban/ Rural classification: categories 1-4/ categories 5,6 (RURAL)
- Accessible/ remote classification: Categories 1-3 & 5/ categories 4,6 (REMOTE)
- Accessible urban/ Rural or remote urban: Categories 1-3/ categories 4-6 (URBANAC).

If using ANY of these three variables, different weights should be used. These are:

- WtRural (to use when analysing by RURAL)

- WtRemote (to use when analysing by REMOTE)
- WtUrban (to use when analysing by URBANAC)

Socio-economic classifications

With the 2001 census, National Statistics have switched from SOC90 to SOC2000 for the coding of occupations. At the same time, they switched from the Social Class and Socio-Economic Group classifications to the new National Statistics Socio-Economic Classification (NS-SEC). The file contains the following variables based on the new classification:

However, there are some time-series analysis where the old classifications may be needed, for example, analysis of changes in the role of class over time.
