# Group VI. Employment and occupation of study parents

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**Data sources:** This data set uses questions from the following questionnaire files: A, B, C, E, F, G, H, J, PA, PB, PC, PD, PE. See ALSPAC main documentation for details.

The data are linked with information on maternal age (MZ028b) socio-economic group (NS-SEC) (C756a, C766a) and ethnic origins (C800a, C804). See ALSPAC main documentation for details.

**Data set:** All mothers enrolled in the study during pregnancy or shortly after delivery regardless of outcome (n = 14541).

## VI.1 Background

The occupations of parents of a child are important for a number of reasons:

- (a) They provide socio-economic indicators.
- (b) The occupation provides an indication of exposures to a variety of chemicals and other hazards that may influence the health of the parent as well as the health and development of the child.
- (c) In addition, the occupations of the grandparents provide additional information on both the social background and possible exposures of the study parents during their own childhood.
- (d) There are particular issues around returning to work for the mother. ALSPAC has documented the ages of the child when this has happened, the reasons why the mother is working and her feelings about leaving her child.
- (e) The longitudinal data provide information for assessing the ways in which occupations change over the early years of a child's life.
- (f) Paternal report was also obtained in pregnancy, allowing a comparison between mother and partner reports of the same occupation.

The structure of this documentation is as follows:

- The actual questions are given verbatim in italics
- The coding instructions for the initial keying process are given in square brackets
- The actual questionnaire used is denoted by a capital letter, and the number of the question within that questionnaire is in round brackets
- The actual frequencies are given in tables, together with the relevant variable number
- A list of all the variables in this file are given in section VI.9; where there has been further coding to preserve the confidentiality of the participants, this is noted here in square brackets. The variable numbers are denoted by one or more letters (denoting the questionnaire) followed by a number.
- Further details of the structure of the survey are given in the ALSPAC main documentation file.

#### VI.2 History of occupations from leaving school onwards

Details of the past occupation history of each parent was obtained specifically in order to obtain information that would help identify chemical and radiation exposures that might influence the outcome of the study pregnancy. The actual jobs and exposures were designed with the assistance of Dr Alexandra Farrow, an environmental epidemiologist working with ALSPAC, coded in America under her supervision, and funded by the National Institutes of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS). Dr Farrow has used the data in her PhD thesis and in a number of research papers.<sup>2,3</sup>

Both of the questionnaires 'Your Environment' (sent to the mother) and 'You and Your Environment' (sent to the mother to give to her partner) were designed to identify exposures to various types of substance whether at work or as a hobby. In addition the mother was asked to list all jobs she had had since the age of 16, together with the materials/machines or chemicals used, the date started and the date stopped. This has resulted in a job history for each woman. The occupations were assigned 3 digit codes from the 1990 Standard Occupational Classification.<sup>4</sup> Exposures reported for each job were also coded with a unique 3 digit coding system. (not given in this dataset) The year and month of starting and finishing specific jobs enabled a calculation of the number of months in any specific job. In order to relate the occupation to the pregnancy, the length of time from the date of starting each job to the date of last menstrual period was measured in months.

## VI.4 Life events relating to job circumstances

A life-events inventory was developed comprising 42+ items which were derived for the present study using previous inventories as a basis for selection of items. Three main sources were used in this way<sup>1-3</sup> – those of Brown & Harris Barnett et al and Stanley. Each life event had 5 response categories indicating not only whether or not the event occurred but also how greatly the

respondent was affected by it. An additional open item in which the respondent was able to name any event which was not on the inventory was also included. On the basis of these items, two scores may be calculated, the number of life events occurring, and the perceived impact of life events. Analysis of pilot study results showed these two scores to be highly correlated, but the impact scored being a more sensitive predicator of emotional well-being. Here we just provide the items related to work.

### VI.10 Suggested statistical exercises

- 1. How do the mother's reports of her partner's occupation correlate with his in regard to classifications such as SOC 90, NS-SEC analytic class and NS-SEC operational category?
- 2. What is the social profile of women whose partners are unemployed? How does this change over time?
- 3. How do the parental occupation classifications compare with one another, and with those of their own parents? Are there differences in regard to parental ages?
- 4. How do the parents rate the effect on them of changes in job circumstances of themselves and of their partner? Does the fact that the mother has lost her job have the same effect on her partner as the effect on the mother of her partner losing his job?
- 5. How much physical effort is perceived to be used for different classifications of job? Does this vary with the age and ethnic origin of the mother, with the no. of hours worked or whether she works shifts?
- 6. What distinguishes those saying that they are satisfied with their jobs from those that are not?
- 7. How constant are the descriptions of returning to work outlined in section VI.6b? Are the reports of lower status reflected in occupational classifications? Are the women who work for career reasons, those who particularly wish they could spend more time with their child?

## Appendix

#### **Deriving NS-SEC**

NS-SEC (National Statistics Socio-Economic Classification) is an eight class occupation based classification designed to measure employment relations and conditions of occupations. These allow delineation of the structure of socio-economic position and in turn help explain variation in social behaviour (Source:ONS). NS-SEC is currently based on the Standard Occupational Classification published in June 2000 (SOC2000).

There are three possible ways of deriving the NS-SEC categories and these depend on the level of information recorded. The 'Full' method requires the SOC2000 unit group, employment status and size of organisation. The 'Reduced' method uses SOC2000 unit group and employment status and finally, the 'Simple' method uses just the SOC2000 unit group. Due to ALSPAC questionnaires not asking about organisation size it was not possible to derive NS-SEC using the 'Full' method was used wherever possible instead. If it was not possible to derive NS-SEC using the 'reduced' method due to lack of information from the questionnaires the 'Simple' method was used.

For a number of files the information as to whether the respondent was self employed and employed others or not was missing as the question was not asked in the relevant questionnaire. However, it was still possible to derive NS-SEC using the reduced method.

The steps for deriving NS-SEC are as follows:

- 1) Text from the questions asking the respondent about their occupation was imported into the CASCOT (Computer Assisted Structured Coding Tool) package recommended and supplied by Peter Elias. This allowed the text to be passed through several processes both automatic and with user intervention to code it to the SOC2000 classification and produce a file of data that could be imported into SPSS.
- 2) Wherever possible the employment status of each individual was derived using a set of matrices available from the ONS converted to SPSS system file format and matched to the data output from CASCOT containing the SOC2000 codes. For those cases with missing information but where inferences could be made based on the text answers the employment status variable was derived using the flow chart in Figure 1 below.

- 3) Once the employment status was derived the managerial/supervisory status of respondents was amended depending on answers provided within the text.
- 4) The appropriate NS-SEC category was then calculated using the employment status code and SOC2000 code using a further set of matrices and SPSS syntax..
