Data Storage

Terms of Use

Why is BBC Lab UK collecting data about you?

All BBC Lab UK studies are designed, approved and conducted in partnership with researchers at leading universities, with the intention of creating new knowledge. These researchers will be taking the anonymous data you have provided - and that of thousands of other BBC Lab UK participants - and analysing it to answer new and exciting research questions.

What will happen to the data I give you?

All data you provide through BBC Lab UK studies will be collected and stored by the BBC in accordance with our privacy policy (please see /privacy) except where these terms and conditions have varied from that policy. The BBC and approved research partners will only use the data you supply in the context of BBC Lab UK studies, unless you give your permission for other specified purposes. All BBC Lab UK data that we pass on to researchers or educators will have any personally identifying details (for example your name and email address) removed, unless you've given your permission for other specified purposes.

Will the BBC ever pass on my email address?

When you register for BBC Lab UK, we ask you to give us an email address. This helps us identify you. It can also be used in place of the 'display name' you create when you register, and it allows us to contact you, for the purposes of administering the BBC Lab UK site and BBC Lab UK studies, provided you have given us permission to do so. We will never pass on your email address to anyone unless you give your permission for us to do so for specified purposes.

Who will be able to access my data?

The data that you submit will be passed on in anonymous form to the researchers with whom BBC Lab UK designed, approved and conducted the study. Other researchers may also request to see the anonymous data for research purposes. The BBC will only pass on data in this instance once it has satisfied itself that:

1. The data will be used to advance knowledge and that any findings will be made publicly available, for example in a peer-reviewed journal

2. The data will be used in a way that conforms to the same ethical standards as the original BBC Lab UK study

3. The data will not be used for commercial purposes

4 Your results data will not be stored with your BBC Identity Account data. The results data will be held anonymously in a secure server accessible only by a small number of BBC staff.

BBC Lab UK will never pass your data on to market research companies, or use it within the BBC for any purpose other than administering the BBC Lab UK website and BBC Lab UK studies.

If you wish to delete a contact from your stored friends and family list, you can do so by emailing us with your details and the details of your contact. You can do this without deleting the results of your own test. All such requests will be dealt with within 28 days.

How long will my data be stored for?

Unless otherwise stated on a per study basis, your anonymous data will be stored by BBC Lab UK for as long as it is useful to science which may be indefinitely. The BBC Lab UK database where the data is stored is a valuable repository of scientific information. Because of this, BBC Lab UK will also identify an external partner to archive in perpetuity copies of its database, containing only anonymous data. This is consistent with other BBC projects, such as WW2: <u>People's War</u> for which the data was archived by the BBC and stored in perpetuity by the United Kingdom Web Archiving Consortium.

If you wish to withdraw from the BBC Lab UK project, you should contact us by e-mail. We will delete all information we hold about you from the BBC Lab UK database within 28 days, and your information will not be included in any subsequent BBC Lab UK study. It will not be possible to remove your information from existing data sets once those data sets have been anonymised, but no-one will be able to connect that data back to you.

How do I find out the results of a BBC Lab UK study?

We will publish the results of all BBC Lab UK studies as soon as is practical. Typically this will be several months after the study has been launched, but the length of time will vary from study to study. This delay allows us to gather sufficient data, and gives our scientific partners enough time to analyse the data thoroughly.

The results of BBC Lab UK studies will also be published in peer reviewed journals. The BBC Lab UK 'Results' page will carry information about recent studies. You can also opt to be emailed when the results of a study go live.




