Note that the household head is not necessarily the respondent to the questionnaire. The household head is the person who is named in reply to the question 'who is the head of your household?'.

The process of listing household members should be done carefully to ensure that no one is missed. To ensure complete coverage, the interviewer should explicitly ask about three types of persons which are commonly overlooked by survey respondents: 1) Persons who are temporarily absent (i.e. less than three months); they should be included; 2) Servants; 3) Infants or small children (these are often overlooked in accountings of household members);

People NOT to include: children who do not reside in the household (e.g. living with relatives) should not be registered as household members even if their parents live in the respective household. People who are travelling or studying away from the house for more than 3 months should also NOT be included.
