



నిజానికి మహాసముద్రాలకు, సముద్రాలకు పేరు పేరు పేర్లు ఉంటాయి, అవి అన్ని కలిసి ఒక నిరంతర ద్రవ్యరాశి అవుతాయి. అట్లాంటిక్, హిందూ, పసిఫిక్ అసేవి మూడు మహాసముద్రాలు. మధ్యధరాసముద్రం, నల్లసముద్రం మరియు ఆర్కిటిక్ సముద్రం వంటివి ఇతర జలసమూహాలను మనము అట్లాంటిక్ మహాసముద్రం లోని ఒక భాగంగా పరిగణిస్తాము. సముద్రం అసేది ఒక మహాసముద్ర భాగము, కాని అది అన్ని పైపులా భూమితో కప్పబడి ఉంటుంది.

భూమి మీద పసిఫిక్ మహాసముద్రం అతి పెద్దది. దాని ఉపరితలం సాంద్రత అట్లాంటిక్, హిందూ మహాసముద్రం కలిస్తే ఉండే పరిమాణం కన్నా ఎక్కువగా ఉంటుంది. అలాగే పసిఫిక్ మహాసముద్రం అత్యంత లో తైనది, అది సుమారుగా 3350 మీ.లో తుగా ఉంటుంది. హిందూ మహాసముద్రం అట్లాంటిక్ మహాసముద్రం కన్నా చిన్నదైనను, దాని సుమారులో తు ఎక్కువగా ఉంటుంది.







After three days, the honey in the cells contains about 20% water. At this stage, the bees cover the cells with lids which they make out of beeswax.

After three days, the honey in the cells contains about 20% water. At this stage, the bees cover the cells with lids which they make out of beeswax.
