Definition of Community: Administrative areas (zones/neighbourhoods in urban areas and *centros poblados*/towns in rural areas) normally used as a starting point - this is an operational definition; in this instrument, it is referred as <u>LOCALITY</u>. The administration of this questionnaire will start with this definition in principle and allows for flexibility to expand it depending on each section. For example, the relevant definition of community for the sections included in Module 2 is the one that includes the service providers of each section (e.g. education, health, etc.).

Selection of informants: Each section has a protocol that should be followed in order to identify one or more informants accordingly.
